HOME CURE FOR CONSUMPTION.

Specialists Now Say Altitude Matters Little—Rest is the Thing.

Physicians have changed all their ideas about consumption in the last few years. The extent of this revolution is described in "La Parola del Medico," by Dr. Antonio Stella, of New York, who was one of the official representatives of the United States at the International Tubercular Congress in Rome in 1912.

What is of prime importance in the treatment of tuberculosis, says Dr. Stella, "is absolute rest, in a climate where there is abundance of sunshine and fresh, pure air, with a medium and not very variable temperature which permits the sick to remain in the open air the greater part of the time. The altitude matters little or not at all."

The favorite treatment now is at home, because the results are more permanent than those obtained elsewhere. "According to the latest statistics by Hammer, Croissant and Fishberg," says Dr. Stella, "the improvement is symptoms obtained by home treatment almost always endures, while that of the sanatoria in the greater number of cases is lost as soon as the patient returns home."

Not only is consumption no longer regarded as hereditary, but a theory that is just the opposite is beginning to be accepted. This is the theory of inherited humanity, first set forth by Col. Rho of the Italian navy ten years ago, and confirmed by the observation of such great specialties as the Italiani, Sanaorelli and Maffucci, the French Landouzy and the Russian Metchnikoff.

"Science," says Dr. Stella, "is asking to-day, 'Do the children of consumptives inherit from their parents a greater disposition to disease or a greater power of overcoming and surviving tubercular infection?' And Sanaorelli replies: 'If the entire human race does not succumb to tubercular pandemic it is due to a progressive hereditary immunization transmitted from generation to generation and reinforced by an unconscious vaccination produced by the general penetration of the ubiquitous Koch bacillus into the organism.'"

Engineer Kills Himself. Atlanta, Oct. 19.—Because he had been subjected to jibes and jeers for riding on street cars during the present strike of motormen and conductors, John F. Delay, an engineer on the Western and Atlantic Railroad, locked himself in his home near here to-day and fatally shot himself. Before he died to-night, he explained to physicians his reason for suicide, and asked that no attempts be made to save his life. Delay, who was 56 years old, had been in poor health for several years. His widow, who is his only immediate survivor, said he told her it would have been too costly for him to hire an automobile and he had to ride an interurban trolley car to report for duty each day.

WHEN COTTON SOLD FOR 20C.

That is the Price It Brought at Greenwood 45 Years Ago.

(Greenwood Journal, 19th.)

R. P. Pinson called at the Journal office to-day to correct one or two errors made in yesterday's paper regarding high prices for cotton in years gone. It was stated in the remarks quoted by Col. C. A. C. Walter and Capt. R. F. Fleming that the present price is the highest since the first two years after the war.

Mr. Pinson says this is a mistake. "I sold cotton on the Greenwood market in the winter of 1871 for 20 cents a pound, and early in August, 1869, I sold several bales in Augusta for 31 1/2 cents. The top of the market then was 35 cents, but my cotton was damaged and I had to sell it at a reduced price.

"I remember also," continued Mr. Pinson, "that I sold the bulk of my cotton in 1867 to Fleming Bros., at Laurens, for 11 cents, and just after I disposed of my last bale the market jumped to 30-odd cents. "And that was a year when I not only sold, but made, my crop under adverse circumstances. I remember that I made 11 bags from frost-bitten cotton seed; did the ploughing myself, barfooted, and my mule was as blind as a bat."

Mr. Pinson is not sure but that cotton raised under such drawbacks was just obliged to come out wrong in the end—as it did to the tune of nearly 20 cents a pound.
