She was removed to a hospital and her husband and parents rushed from New York to join her here. Miss Vida Milholland, her sister, was with her when she was stricken and has been in constant attendance since that time. that time.

Mrs. Boissevain's illness was diag-

nosed as aplastic anemia and blood transfusion was resorted to in attempts to improve her condition.
