TRAWLER TURNED INTO RAIDER

Submarine Captures and Transforms Vessel Into Coastwise Pirate.

Washington, Aug 21 .- Navy Department officials to-night confidentawaited a wireless dispatch telling of the capture or destruction of the trawler Triumph, which was seized by a German submarine yesterday, a German crew put aboard, the vessel armed and started on a raiding expedition against the defenseless fleet of fishing smake onerating on the Grand Banks. Every precaution has been taken, it was said, to prevent the raider slipping through the line stretched around the fishing region.

The department through Admiral Benson, Acting Secretary, requested newspapers to make no mention of the type of craft being employed in the hunt. It was said, however, are numerous and swift enough to make the eventual apprehension of the converted fishing vessel absolutely certain unless the enemy crew destroys the ship or attempts to engage one of the pursuers in unequal combat.

Can't Keep It Up.

Officials here expressed the belief to-day that the German commander realized the utter hopelessness of his venture continuing operations for more than 24 hours. Some considered that a rendezvous with the submarine had been arranged by the crew of the Triumph, after which the Triumph would be sunk so that the patrol flotillas would find it necessary to continue their hunt for several days. This would result, the German officers might hope, in a large force being held along the Grand Banks, lessening the strength of the coast guard at other points. The answer made to this possibility is that adequate forces are now in service at every vital point to protect all ships.

First News. The only dispatches received by the department concerning the newest manoeuvre of the German submarine flotilla off the American coast was a brief message from the commander of the First Naval District at Boston. This dispatch merely confirmed the landing of the captain and crew of the Triumph and reiterated the story told by these sailors. Six hours earlier this information was given to the Navy Department through press dispatches and was flashed by naval wireless to officers in command of patrol forces in the

Time Too Limited.

Admiral Benson expressed the opinion it would be impossible for the Germans in the limited time at their disposal to equip the Triumph properly as a raider. Such a task, he pointed out, would occupy the New York navy yard nearly a week. With a crew of 17 men, however, armed with revolvers and a machine gun or two, the Triumph would be able to capture and destroy a number of small craft. The maximum military advantages the Germans can hope to obtain, it was held, was 7, 9 p. m. Local committee: St. John the depletion of the supply of canned

Doesn't Credit Report.

Admiral Benson refused to place much credence in the declaration made by the submarine commander to the captain of the Triumph that six U-boats now are operating in American waters. Very careful checking of all information regarding the activities of these craft has convinced naval officials that only three have been actively engaged. The acting secretary warned against the public placing too much hope in stories of German submersibles be ing destroyed. In this connection he divulged the fact that the claim of a British merchantman having sunk a submarine after a long range gun duel already has been definitely controverted. It was on this same submarine, and several days later, that Capt. Evans, of the steamer Penistone, was detained after his ship had been captured and sunk.

Fishing Schooner Sunk.

A Canadian Atlantic Port, Aug. 21, -The fishing schooner Lucille Sennare, of Lunenberg, N. S., was sunk late to-day by the trawler Triumph, which a German submarine crew has converted into a raider. Both bombs and gunfire were used. The crew arrived at Canso to-night.

Members of the crey said that the Pasenda, another fishing vessel, was in the vicinity when the Schnare was sent down. Although they did not see any attack upon the Pasenda they expressed the opinion that she was sunk after the Germans had finished with the Schnare. None of the crew of the Pasenda had been reported as having reached shore late to-night. Fishing Fleet Destroyed.

The exact number of vessels destroyed is not known, but the corporation's fleet generally consisted of eight or nine vessels.

Schooners reported sunk on the Grand Banks up to this afternoon are: The Pasenda, Una P. Saunders, Lucile Schnare (Canadian); Francis J. O'Hara, A.Piatt Andrews, Sylvania (American); Dela Garde (registry not identified).

The rescued crew of the fishing schooner Lucille Schnare, which reached port last night, reported that the Pasenda was nearby when their craft was destroyed by gunfire and bombs. When they left the vicinity in small boats, they said, no attack had been made on the Pasenda.

Six fishing schooners so far have fallen victim to the Triumph, whose German crew of 16 men, according to rescued crews of vessels she had sunk, have been operating with two guns and wireless outfit aboard the captured trawler. The Triumph is said to have 20 days' supply of coal in her bunkers.

Destruction of another fishing schooner was reported with the arrival at Gabarus, Cape Breton, of 16 of the crew of the Dela Garde. They said their vessel was sunk on the fishing banks by a submarine. One of the men is injured. A dory containing three of the crew is missing.

British Ship Escapes. An Atlantic Port, Aug. 22 .-- A British freight steamship which arrived here to-day from European waters was attacked by a submarine yesterday afternoon near Nantucket. One torpedo was fired by the U-boat,

by the U-boat took effect. Sub. Operates With Triumph.

A Canadian Atlantic Port, Aug. 22. -A German submarine, presumably the craft which captured the Triumph, is operating with the raiding trawler, said Capt. Jeff Thomas, of the Sylvania, who arrived here in a power dory after his schooner was sunk by the raider. As he and his men rowed away from their craft, which the Germans bombed, they saw, two miles distant, a large submersible lying on the surface.

Capt Thomas came into port with two of his fishermen. Nineteen men and a boy of his crew, he said, have not been reported, but he is confident they have landed at some remote village on the Cape Breton

The captain said he sighted the Triumph an hour and a half before his vessel was destroyed, but he did not suspect the trawler until it came alongside and he was ordered to leave his ship "and be quick about

Expect to Capture Triumph.

Washington, Aug. 22 .- Absence of any definite report of activity to-day on the part of the raider Triumph, the converted steam trawler armed by 16 members of a German U-boat crew, strengthened the belief held in naval circles that the vessel is no longer on the North Atlantic fishing grounds. While numerous dispatches were received during the day detailing the effects of the Triumph's foray

The flet was operating off the Grand as described by Admiral Benson,

chief of naval operations, that officials here are positive the Triumph could not have escaped the net spread for her capture. The only possible explanation of the failure of patrol craft to capture the raider will be that she has been sunk by her crew, possibly after the men have returned to the submarine.

Immediately upon receipt of news that the Triumph had been seized as an auxiliary by the Germans, naval experts expressed the opinion that the cruise of the raider would be short, probably lasting only from 24 to 36 hours, and this fact was realized by the German commander in planning the coup. In naval circles I think it was caused by over work. the belief was held that the German | My back got terribly sore and ached dezvous and sink the trawler or would sink the craft and take to small boats in an attempt to reach some desolate part of the coast, from which point they hope to make their way inland and find places of hiding.

The possibility that the raider's crew might capture some craft of an entirely different type and try to slip through the patrol of fleets makes the work of the hunters more exacting. Undoubtedly every steamer, vessel and yacht met by the patrol ships will be stopped and questioned and probably boarded for a more strict examination before being pernitted to pass.

Only confirmation of the press dispatches came to the Navy Department to-day in the wireless messages dealing with the hunt for the Triumph. Locations of the points at which the enemy ship was reported to have come in contact with victims were carefully plotted, the results furnishing valuable data for the use of the coast patrol vessels.
