

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

State of South Carolina,
County of Oconee.

Notice is hereby given that the General Election for United States Senator (full term) and Representatives in Congress, and a Special Election for United States Senator (short term) will be held at the voting precincts fixed by law in the County of Oconee, on TUESDAY, November 5th, 1918, said day being Tuesday following the first Monday, as prescribed by the State Constitution.

The qualifications for suffrage are as follows:
Residence in State for two years, in the county one year, in the polling precinct in which the elector offers to vote, four months, and the payment six months before any election of any poll tax then due and payable: Provided, that ministers in charge of an organized church, and teachers of public schools shall be entitled to vote after six months' residence in the State, otherwise qualified.

Registration.—Payment of all taxes, including poll tax, assessed and collectible during the previous year. The production of a certificate or receipt of the officer authorized to collect such taxes shall be conclusive proof of the payment thereof.
Before the hour fixed for opening the polls Managers and Clerks must take and subscribe to the Constitutional oath. The Chairman of the Board of Managers can administer the oath to the other Managers and to the Clerk; a Notary Public must administer the oath to Chairman. The Managers elect their Chairman and Clerk.

Polls at each voting place must be opened at 7 o'clock a. m., and closed at 4 o'clock p. m., except in the city of Charleston, where they shall be opened at 7 a. m., and closed at 6 p. m.

The Managers have the power to fill a vacancy; and if none of the Managers attend, the citizens can appoint, from among the qualified voters, the Managers, who, after being sworn, can conduct the election.

At the close of the election, the Managers and Clerks must proceed publicly to open the ballot box and count the ballots therein, and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result for each office, and sign the same. Within three days thereafter the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the box containing the ballots and written statements of the result of the election.

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

State of South Carolina,
County of Oconee.

Notice is hereby given that the General Election for State and County Officers will be held at the voting precincts prescribed by law in the said County, on TUESDAY, November 5th, 1918, said day being Tuesday following the first Monday in November, as prescribed by the State Constitution.

The qualification for suffrage: Managers of Election shall require of every elector offering to vote at any election, before allowing him to vote, the production of his registration certificate and proof of the payment of all taxes, including poll tax, assessed against him and collectible

during the previous year. The production of a certificate or of the receipt of the officer authorized to collect such taxes, shall be conclusive proof of the payment thereof.
Section 237, Code of 1912, as amended by Act No. 6, Special Session of 1914.

Section 237. There shall be three separate and distinct ballots, as follows: One ballot for United States Senator, Representatives in Congress and Presidential Electors; and one ballot for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, State Officers, Circuit Solicitors, Members of the House of Representatives, State Senator, County Officers, and one ballot for all constitutional Amendments and special questions, each of three said boxes to be appropriately labeled; which ballots shall be of plain white paper, and of such width and length as to contain the names of the officer or officers and question or questions to be voted for or upon, clear and even cut, without ornament, designation, mutilation, symbol or mark of any kind whatsoever, except the name or names of the person or persons voted for and the office to which such person or persons are intended to be chosen, and all special questions, which name or names, office or offices, question or questions shall be written or printed or partly written or partly printed thereon in black ink; and such ballot shall be so folded as to conceal the name or names, question or questions thereon, and so folded shall be deposited in a box to be constructed, kept and disposed of as herein provided by law, and no ballot of any other description found in either of said boxes shall be counted.

On all special questions the ballot shall state the question, or questions, and shall thereafter have the words "Yes" and "No" inserted so that the voter may indicate his vote by striking out one or the other of such words on said ballot, the word so struck out to be counted.

Before the hour fixed for opening the polls, the Managers and Clerks must take and subscribe the Constitutional oath. The Chairman of the Board of Managers can administer the oath to the other members and to the Clerk; a Notary Public must administer the oath to the Chairman. The Managers elect their Chairman and Clerk.
Polls at each voting place must be opened at 7 o'clock a. m., and closed at 4 o'clock p. m., except in the city of Charleston, where they shall be opened at 7 a. m., and closed at 6 p. m.

Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots, and written statements of the results of the election.

At the said election qualified electors will vote upon the adoption or rejection of Amendments to the State Constitution, as provided in the following Joint Resolutions:

A Joint Resolution to Amend Section 7 of Article VIII of the Constitution, Relating to Bonded Indebtedness, by adding a Provision Thereto as to the City of Abbeville.

A Joint Resolution Proposing an Amendment to Section 14a, of Article X of the Constitution, by Allowing the City of Charleston, through the City Council, to Assess Abutting Property for Permanent Improvement, and to Pay for the Permanent Improvement of the Intersection of Streets for Curbing and the Laying of Drains without the Consent of the Property Owners.

A Joint Resolution to Amend Section 5, Article XI, of the Constitution, Relating to School Districts, by adding a Special Provision as to Greenville County.

A Joint Resolution to Amend Section 20, Article III, of the Constitution by inserting after the Words "Viva Voce," the Words "Except by Unanimous Consent."

A Joint Resolution Proposing an Amendment to Article X of the Constitution by Adding Thereto Section 19, to Empower the City of Abbeville to Assess Abutting Property for Permanent Improvements.

A Joint Resolution to Amend Article X (10) of the Constitution by Adding Thereto a Section 17, to Empower Any or All Incorporated Cities and Towns to Assess Abutting Property for Permanent Improvements.

A Joint Resolution to Amend Section 7 of Article VIII of the Constitution, Relating to Municipal Bonded Indebtedness, by Adding a Provision Thereto as to the City of Orangeburg.

A Joint Resolution Proposing to Amend Section 17 of Article VIII of the Constitution Relating to Municipal Bonded Indebtedness.

A Joint Resolution to Amend Section 7 of Article VIII and Section 5 of Article X, of the Constitution, so as to Exempt the Cities of Rock Hill and Florence from the Provisions Thereof.

A Joint Resolution Proposing an Amendment to Article X of the Constitution by Adding Thereto Section 16, to Empower the Town of Pendleton to Assess Abutting Property for Permanent Improvements.

RED CROSS NOTES.
Walhalla Branch.

Next Thursday has been set aside as "Mending Day" at the Walhalla Red Cross rooms, and the members are urged to be present on that day and help with the mending of a number of shirts for the soldiers. These garments have all been carefully washed and put in sanitary condition, so no one need fear infection.

The Bureau of Aircraft Production of the War Department has requested the Red Cross to give the widest possible publicity to the vital need of walnut wood for use in the making of aeroplane propeller blades and gun stocks. The matter is accordingly being brought to the attention of the entire Red Cross organization in all parts of the country, with the request that the statement be read in all chapter, branch and auxiliary work rooms, posted on bulletin boards, inserted in local newspapers and in all other ways given full publicity.

The Bureau of Aircraft Production states that walnut has been found to be the best and most desirable wood in the construction of aeroplane propeller blades and gun stocks. Both of these are essential parts of war machinery. Walnut trees are scattered through different parts of the United States, growing in small groups, and in taking the necessary steps to see that the trees are made available to the government, the owners of trees have an opportunity to demonstrate their patriotism in a most practical and effective manner. Only a part of the lumber produced from each tree can be used, and the government cannot, therefore, buy the trees from the owners. When the trees are sold to a saw-mill which has a government contract for lumber for propeller blades or gun stocks, this wood will be sorted out and put to the uses of which it is best adapted. Owners of walnut trees can probably find out in their communities which saw-mills have government contracts; but if this information is not available, please write, giving the number of trees and their location, to the "Ordnance Department, Procurement Division, Small Arms Section, Washington, D. C."

Let every one help the government in locating these trees and in getting their owners to take steps to have them put in this very necessary war use.
