German Surrender Unconditional!

Armistice Signed Monday Morning, Nov. 11--At Allies' Mercy.

London, Nov. 10.—The former German Emperor and his party, which is believed to include Field Marshal Hindenburg, arrived at Eysden, on the Dutch frontier, at 7.30 o'clock Sunday morning. Practically the whole German general staff accompanied the fleeing Emperor. Ten automobiles carried the party. The automobiles bristled with rifles, and all of the fugitives were heavily armed.

GERMANY ACCEPTS THE TERMS.

Defeated Huns Bow to the Inevitable by Signing Armistice.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 11.—The world war ended this morning at 6 o'clock, Washington time—11 o'clock Paris time. The armistice was signed by the German representatives at midnight.

The above announcement has been made officially by the State Department, and is authentic and reliable.

The Terms are Stern.

The terms of the armistice, while not as yet made public, are sure to be stern in their demands for reparation and indemnities.

Military men here regard it as certain that they will include: Immediate retirement of all German military forces from France, Belgium and Alsace-Lorraine, and disarmament and demobilization of the German armies.

Occupation by Allied and American forces of such strategic points in Germany as will make impossible a renewal of hostilities.

Delivery of parts of the German high seas fleet and a certain number of submarines to the Allied and American naval forces.

Disarmament of all other German warships under supervision of the Allied and American navies, which will guard them.

The occupation of the principal German naval bases by the sea forces of the victorious nations.

The release of Allied and American soldiers, sailors and civilians held as prisoners in Germany, without such reciprocal action by the associated governments.

NO STATE FAIR THIS YEAR.

Postponed on Account of Influenza, Successful Fair Impossible.

Editor Keowee Courier: I am very sorry that the management of the South Carolina State Fair announces that there can be no fair held this fall.

Health conditions throughout the State caused the State Board of Health, several weeks ago, to postpone indefinitely the fair from the original dates, October 23 to November 1st, and it is now deemed inadvisable to attempt to hold the fair at this late date.

Also, the present congested condition of transportation companies is such as to make the immediate delivery of exhibits very uncertain. Further, the general unrest of the people on account of war conditions and pressing labor shortage, would make attendance upon the fair decidedly problematical.

Because of these reasons the members of the executive committee have decided to hold no fair for the year 1918, and trust that this decision will meet with the approval of the exhibitors and the public generally.

From present indications, the war will soon come to a successful conclusion, and no effort will be spared to make the 1919 fair the greatest in the history of the society.

NOTICE OF PRIMARY ELECTION.

People to Choose Successor to Late Thomas E. Sanders.

On account of the death of T. E. Sanders, the Democratic nominee for Supervisor of Oconee county, the County Executive Committee has ordered a special primary election to be held on the last Tuesday in November, the 26th—to fill the vacancy above mentioned.

YOUNG MEN IN AUTO WRECK.

Glenn Alexander Loses Life as Result of Accident Near Catechee.

Glenn Alexander, Joe and Duffy Tow, Frank Taylor and Hugh Elcain, all of Oconee, were in an automobile wreck near the Catechee Mills, in Pickens county, last Sunday. As a result of the accident Glenn Alexander died Monday evening about 3 o'clock at the home of a citizen of the neighborhood in which the accident occurred. No minute particulars were obtainable by us as to the cause of the wreck, but our informant stated that it was ascertained that at least some of the members of the party of five young men were drinking. The five young men were all residents of Oconee.

Glenn Alexander, who lost his life, resided in the Lay's Mill section. He is survived by a wife and two children. The two Tow youths are residents of the Bethel section. Hugh Elcain resides, we are informed, in the Flat Shoal community. Frank Taylor's place of residence was not known to our informant, who had been in Pickens county, and saw the body of Alexander after he had died. He stated also that Frank Taylor's condition was regarded as very serious indeed, but that he had been taken to his home. Taylor, it is said, was driving the car at the time of the accident. The car was making fast time, ran into a ditch or gully and turned over twice before the mechanism was entirely put out of commission and the body of the car brought to a standstill. All of the members of the party were more or less injured, but it is understood that the two Tow young men and Elcain are not considered to be very seriously injured.
