Civil War in Germany.

Copenhagen, Jan. 7.—Berlin is in a state of complete anarchy and civil war has begun there, according to the Munich correspondent of the Politiken. His information, he says, is based on telegraphic messages from the German capital.

All the banks are barricaded and a great number of the public buildings are in the hands of the Spartans, an extreme radical group.

Thousands of armed workmen of the Spartacus faction are crowding the streets, and at several points firing has begun.
