"Every taxpayer who can possibly do so is urged to pay his entire tax when filing his return, on or before March 15th."

Sumter, Feb. 19.—An unusual homicide occurred in this city early this morning when Irby I. Baker, white, was shot to death by his nephew, William M. Baker, at the Atlantic Coast Line passenger station. It seems that the dead man, who was 57 years of age, had been paying special attention to the daughter of William M. Baker, a girl about 18 years of age.

At Station Armed.

At an early hour this morning Policeman Carrigan saw William M. Baker at the station carrying a double-barreled shot gun and asked him what he wanted, and he replied he was looking for an old man and a young girl.
