INCOME TAX PAYMENT EARLIER TWENTY MISERABLE

March 15 Fixed as Final Date-Don't Wait Till Late.

Columbia, Feb. 19 .- Special: Income tax payments this year are due earlier than ever before. The first payment is due March 15th, simultaneous with the final due date of the return required by the new revenue law.

"File and pay by March 15th" is he new slogan of the internal reveque bureau. Collector Heyward is preparing to handle the flood of income tax payments that will reach lim between now and the close of business on Saturday, March 15th.

"Early payment of income taxes is one of the utmost importance in meeting the Treasury's debts brought about by the war," explains Collector Heyward. "The new law names March 15th as the first payment date because there are large obligations outstanding in the form of certificates of indebtedness that must be met on that date.

"The earlier payment this year should cause no hardship to taxpayanticipated the enactment of the new law and have set aside a regovernment tax.
