**FORMER OCONEEAN DEAD.**

**S. A. King Died in Georgia in Last December—Relatives Here.**

S. A. King, who was well known to many in Oconee, died at White, Ga., last December. He was a brother of James T. King, of Walthalla, and two sisters, Mrs. W. H. Toy, of Highlands, N. C., and Mrs. Clara Holder, of Decoma, Okla., also survive him. The following tribute to the deceased appeared in the Tribune-News, of Cartersville, Ga., of a recent date:

**S. A. King.**

In the death of S. A. King, of White, Ga., Bartow county has lost one of her best and most useful citizens. Mr. King was born at Walthalla, S. C., on June 28, 1856, and died at White, Ga., December 16th, 1918. His body was interred at Cross Roads church, White, Ga., on December 17th.

When quite a young man—in 1877—Mr. King moved from South Carolina to Georgia, settling down in Pickens county. He resided in that county until 1896, when he moved his family to Bartow county, where he had resided continuously since.

He was married to Miss Lula Frozier at Walthalla, S. C., in 1876. As a result of this union seven children were born, four of whom survive—McAfee King, of Akron, Ohio; Elmer King, Mrs. Patrie Ward and Orris King, of White, Ga.

Mr. King was in business at White for thirteen years, and therefore he came in contact with the general public. His uniform courtesy and generosity won and held for him a host of friends, who mourn his passing. If I were called upon to enumerate his chief characteristics I would name his unflinching courtesy, honesty and integrity. I have done business with him for ten years, and I am positive that I knew him intimately. He never failed to meet me with a smile, and I will ever cherish in my memory the pleasant hours spent in his company. His honesty was his religion, his honor his creed, and of such are the uncrowned kings of earth.

I have known him since I played around my mother's knees, but I never knew him to betray a friend or to stoop to a questionable act. His fine, honorable principle was his chief asset in business, and his reputation for fair dealing created in his customers unbounded confidence in his honesty and integrity. He will be missed by all of us who knew him and loved him. When I went to White this week selling groceries I missed his face and his smile behind the counter. The finest tribute I have heard paid him was by a customer of his this week when he said, "I have been dealing with Mr. King for years, and I could always depend on what he told me." Truthfulness—the finest element in any man's character.

Mr. King was not a wealthy man. He could have been. He sacrificed thousands by his generosity. I personally know this to be true. He could not turn a deaf ear to human want and human suffering. He literally clothed the naked and fed the hungry. He was not a member of the church, and it is not given to me to judge, but if it were I would say, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant; enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

None of us knows when, why, how or where the grim reaper will cut us down with the unfailing scythe. Little did I dream, when I saw Mr. King last week, hale and hearty, that today his body would be in the cemetery and his spirit flown from this earth forever.

The greatest lesson that the younger generation can learn from Mr. King's life is that honor and honesty pay. They are assets which cannot be discounted in this world, not in the world hereafter. No finer epitaph can be written on any man's tomb than "Here lies an honest man." Verner Vincent, Cartersville, Ga., Dec. 20, 1918.

Jason Lee Writes of What He Has Been Seeing "Over There."

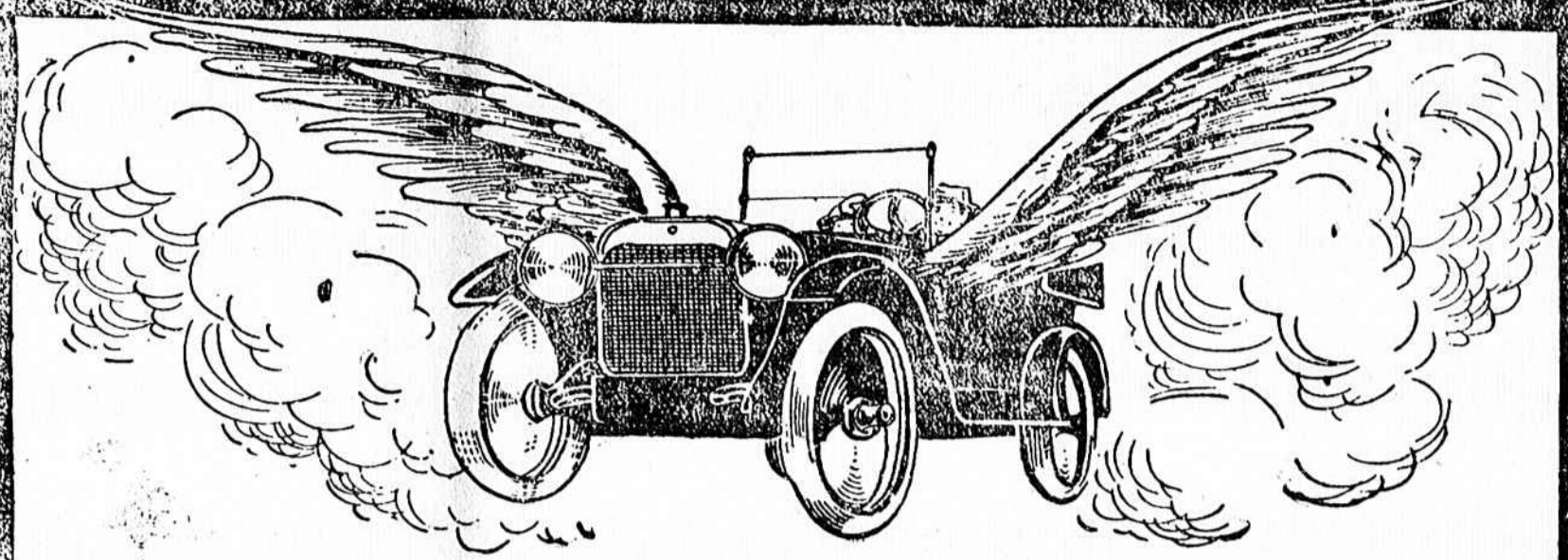

Bar-sur-Aub, France,  
March 13th, 1919.

Dear Father:

This leaves me as well as usual, and I hope it will find all well at home. I am sending home some souvenirs of France. Among these souvenirs is a belt that I got up in the Argonne Forest—and I sure would have liked to have seen the dough-boy when he cut that belt off of one of the Germans. Clarence a cap, and a hat for Ray. I bought the cap and a friend gave me the hat. You can give them to the kids. I am sending my Testament and the diary that I kept over here. The most important things that happened to me are put down in the Testament, which I brought with me from Camp Wadsworth. These are special things that I wanted to go back and I did not think that I could ever get all of them back with me when I come.

I guess you are all farming now. It makes me think about it when the sun shines out, but it does not shine very much over here. The trees have begun to bud and a lot of flowers are in bloom now over here, and it is very warm. I am going in my shirt sleeves, my collar open and my sleeves rolled up, which seems like home to me.

The boys are still hollering "When are we going home?"

Our government has got a lot of horses and mules in here, and from their looks Uncle Sam could move most anything, for the animals are fine.

I will try to describe the French way of working stock. They use big, heavy curb bits, which look very cruel to me; big, heavy collars and hames made together; then they hitch one horse in front of the other. I have seen as many as six hitched to one cart, and five of them pulling from the end of the shafts. They use only one line in driving. The second horse's traces are hitched to the end of the shafts, and the third is hitched to the second, and so on to the lead. All horses and cattle are led by the neck with big leather straps, and when they are hitched to anything they sure do "stay where they are put."

The French are awfully rough in their treatment of horses. They always carry good, rough raw-hide whips, and I have seen horses kicked by their drivers with their hob-nailed shoes. They use carts most of the time, and these carts are about as large as our big log carts. Their buggies are awfully clumsy-looking. The wheels are about as heavy as our one-horse wagon wheels.

The houses here look funny until one gets used to them. I was talking to a girl last night, and she told me the house in which she lived was built three hundred years ago. The homes, however, are neat and well-kept on the inside. The women seem

to be good housekeepers, but are sorry cooks.

But I must close, as I have made this letter too long already.

To Grave—Widow of Rev. W. T. Duncan Died Easter Morning.

Sumter, April 23.—Mrs. Rebecca Green Duncan died very suddenly on Easter morning at the residence of her brother, John T. Green, of Sumter. Mrs. Duncan had been unwell and was in a very weakened condition as a result of an attack of influenza during the winter. Just a few weeks ago her husband, Rev. Waddy T. Duncan, died in Fountain Inn, where he was pastor of the Fountain Inn Methodist church. Mrs. Duncan had come to Sumter for a visit to her brother. She was sick, but was not thought to be in immediate danger. She passed quietly away in the early hours of Easter morning.

Mrs. Duncan was a cultured, intelligent woman, and had the love and respect of a large circle of friends. She was a daughter of the late Dr. Henry D. Green. She leaves three children—Waddy T. Duncan, a student at the University of South Carolina; Lalla C. Duncan, a student

at Lander, and Rebecca Allston Duncan.

The body of Mrs. Duncan was taken to Fountain Inn and buried beside that of her husband.

**CAN'T MAKE LIQUOR AT HOME.**

There will be No Legal Way to Get Around National Prohibition.

Washington, April 23.—Persons who may be planning to make liquor in their own homes after national prohibition becomes effective July 1 are to be warned by the revenue authorities as to the penalties to which they will be subject. The internal revenue bureau to-day sent to revenue collectors and agents a summary of laws on the subject, and penalties, with the suggestion that they be made known widely.

The schedule of penalties for various violations is as follows: For failure to register still, \$500 penalty, fine of between \$100 and \$1,000, and imprisonment of between one month and two years.

For making liquor in a community where it is prohibited by local or State laws, tax of \$1,000.

For violation of war-time prohibition, \$1,000 fine or one year imprisonment, or both.

For making whiskey mash or beer, fine of between \$500 and \$5,000, and imprisonment of between six months and three years.

Beer-making comes within the same prohibitions.

**EUROPE BACK TO WAR BREAD.**

America Has Enough Wheat to Continue to Eat "White Bread."

Paris, April 26.—An increase in the milling percentage which will virtually put the world back to war bread basis for the next three months is part of the program adopted by the Supreme Food Council, under the chairmanship of Herbert C. Hoover.

The program also includes a complete plan for securing and distributing food to Allied, liberated, neutral and enemy countries until the next harvest. One object of the program is to determine the available food supply, and so to distribute shipping as not to put undue pressure on any one market.

**White Bread for Us.**

New York, April 25.—Americans will continue to eat "white bread,"

restored late last year after months of milling on a Victory flour basis, despite the return of European countries to a war bread basis, as has been announced by the Supreme Food Council. This was the statement made by Julius H. Barnes, president of the Food Administration Grain Corporation and Federal Wheat Director.

A survey of the wheat stocks, Mr. Barnes said, had convinced his department that the American supply was sufficient not only to warrant the continued production of all-wheat flour, but to meet the export demand until the next harvest.
