Fricks, of Walhalla; Milligan Fricks, of Helena, Mont.; and C. C. Fricks, of Stone Mountain, Ga., and one sister, Mrs. J. H. Schlueter, of Washington, D. C. Mrs. Kaufmann was a most excellent woman, an humble Christian, and a consistent member of the Baptist church. Funeral services were conducted Monday morning, the interment being made in the Lutheran cemetery, in the family lot. The services were conducted by Rev. L. W. Langston, of the Baptist church, and Rev. W. B. Aull, of the Lutheran church. 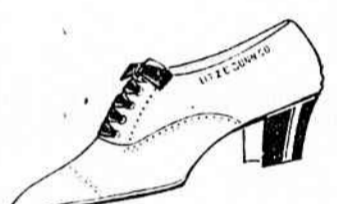
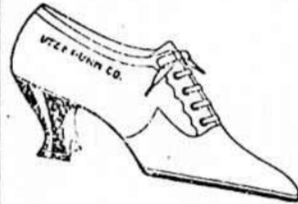
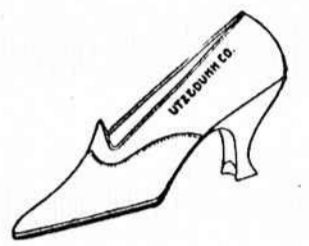
