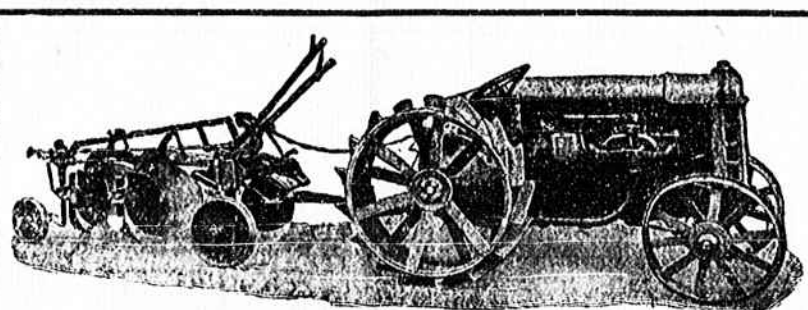

For the next two weeks we will have a Fordson Tractor pulling a saw mill on the W. H. Butler farm, two miles from Walhalla, on the Walhalla-Westminster road. Every one is invited to come out to the Butler farm any day for the next two weeks and see the work going on.

The Fordson is expected to cut from 4,000 to 5,000 feet of lumber every day. We will work ten hours a day, and with one Fordson pulling the saw mill and another logging, we expect to do this job with less cost than any other way that it could be done.

Thursday and Friday, on the same farm, we are going to do some very difficult plowing. This will give you an opportunity to see a few more things that a farmer can do with a Fordson.
