

DEATH OF MRS. T. A. SPENCER.

Was Greatly Beloved and Highly Respected Christian Lady.

Madison, Dec. 15.—Special: While this old earth was wrapped in slumber, early Friday morn, Dec. 5th, the death angel silently walked the streets of our little town and touched our friend and neighbor, Mrs. T. A. Spencer.

While loving hands did all that could be done, God willed that she should go. Though 'tis hard, the loved ones have the consolation of knowing that mother has only crossed over and is waiting and watching on the other side and will be there to welcome them, one by one, as they come. She is safe in the arms of Jesus, now free from all pain and care. Just a short time before her death she told one of her daughters that she was ready to go any time God called, and that if the pain did not get better she could not live much longer.

Mrs. Spencer had been an invalid for about 30 years, but on Monday before her death pneumonia set in, and the end came early Friday morning as a release from her terrible pain and suffering. She would have been 76 years old had she lived till Jan. 1st. On Oct. 21st, 1869, she was married to T. A. Spencer. Unto this union eight children were given, and seven are living—Robert Spencer, of Cornelia, Ga.; Lewis and Erwin Spencer, of Westminster; Henry Spencer, of Missouri; Mrs. M. L. Jones, of Westminster; Mrs. Bessie Walters and Miss Belle Spencer, of this place.

Mrs. Spencer was the second daughter of James and Lavina Duke and was born in Laurens county. Her parents came to this county when she was quite young. Besides a numberless host of friends, Mrs. Spencer leaves a husband, seven children, two sisters and 30 grandchildren to mourn her death. The sisters are Mrs. Elizabeth Adams, Madison, Rt. 1; Mrs. W. P. Carver, Walhalla.

Early in young womanhood Mrs. Spencer joined the Baptist church. Her body was laid to rest in Chauga cemetery, of which church she was a member. The services were conducted by Rev. J. A. Martin, of Westminster.

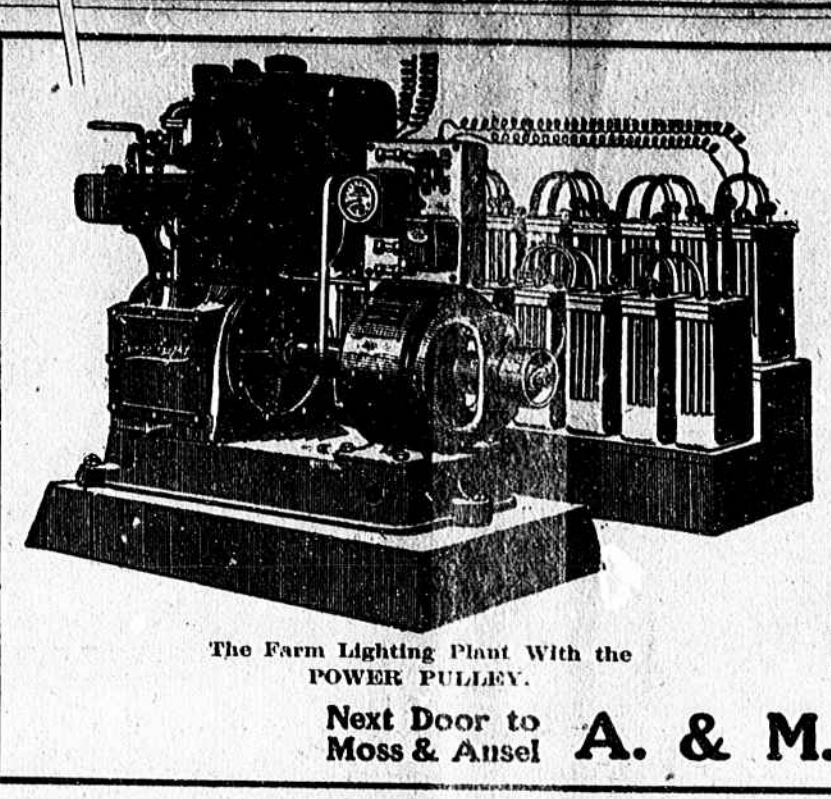
Lon Patterson, of Townville, was a recent visitor to his cousins, Mr. and Mrs. John Sanders.
