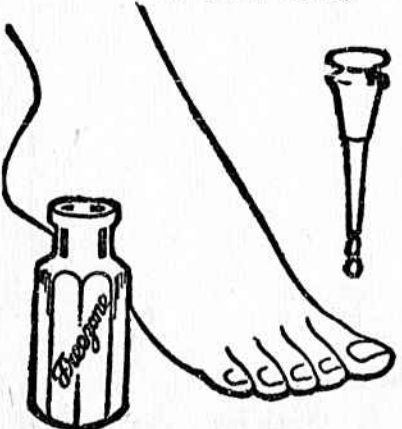
Says Russ Reds Called U. S. Rising.

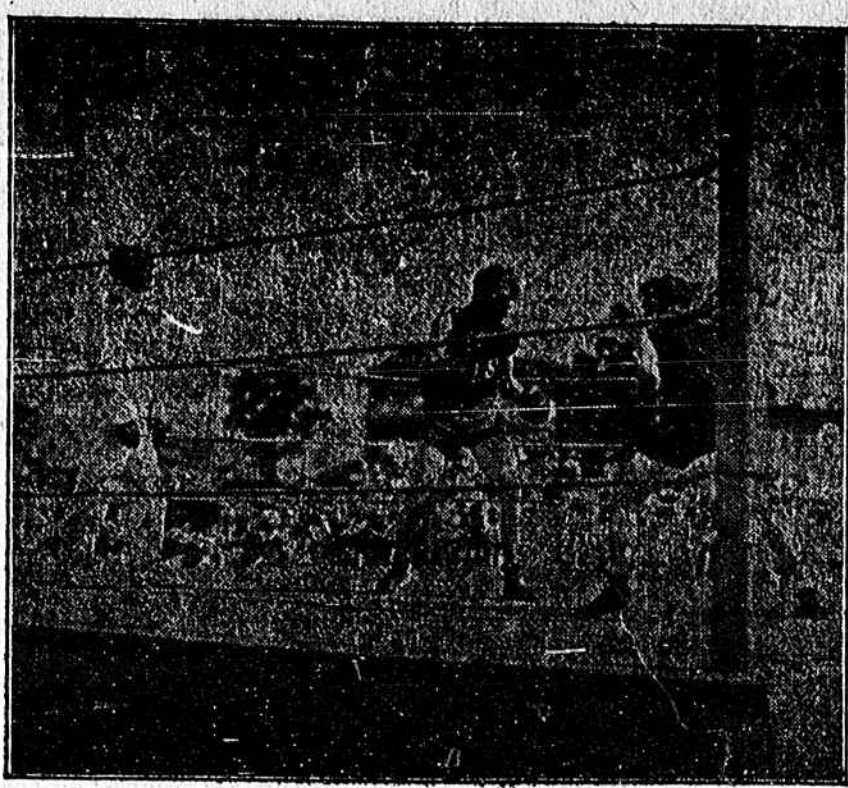
According to Col. Steplin, a copy of the proclamation has been sent to Washington for observation by United States government officials.

24 BAKERS AND FIRMS INDICTED

Federal Jury at Charlotte Returns
Indictments in Many Cases.

Charlotte, N. C., April 24.—Twenty-four firms and individuals in this State and South Carolina were indicted by the Federal grand jury here this afternoon. They are charged with having entered into a conspiracy to raise the price of bread, the alleged agreement having been made in a meeting held here on Jan. 8, 1920.

Those indicted were: H. O. Miller, the Purity Bakery; J. W. Zindelle, E. Y. Crossmore, Geo. P. Wadsworth, and the Carolina Baking Company, of Charlotte; F. A. Feuchtenburger and J. L. Bennett, of Chester, S. C.; The Rock Hill Steam Bakery Company, of Rock Hill, S. C.; The Gelfuss Bakery, of Spartanburg, S. C.; W. E. Todd, the Todd Steam Bakery, R. Hoke Dryson, J. B. Pearson, R. H. Brinson and W. F. Pearson, of Gastonia, N. C.; J. A. Cureton, of Greenville, S. C.; Jack Hernig, of Monroe, N. C.; L. C. Bost, of Shelby, N. C., and M. K. Zingell, D. Z. Miller, D. J. Devendash and the Asheville Steam Bakery, of Asheville, N. C.

The cases are expected to be tried here at a special term of Federal Court in June or July. Conviction carries a fine of \$5,000 or two years in the penitentiary, or both.

Greenbacks for Boys in Germany.

Coblenz, April 15.—American doughboys in the occupation zone are preparing to give a hearty welcome to the shipment of American greenbacks, enroute from the United States. Some soldiers have not seen American paper money for almost three years, having been paid in francs or marks since their arrival in Europe. Hereafter the army post-office and commissary will be run on a dollar basis.

Difficulties encountered during the last few months, when foreign exchange rates have been rapidly fluctuating, caused a change in the system. The army postoffice has lost money often because of the exchange situation, having sold to an officer or soldier money orders in dollars to the amount of the buyers monthly pay, accepting marks in payment at the rate of exchange prevailing the previous month. It has been found that if the mark rises few orders are bought, while if the mark falls there is a rush on the office until it fills to overflowing with paper.

TWO MEN ARE SHOT ON TRAIN.

Prominent Planter and the Conductor
of Train Are Principals.

Florence, S. C., April 13.—R. H. McClenaghan, conductor, and Ezander Hewitt, of Marion, a passenger on Atlantic Coast Line train No. 55, from Wilmington, N. C., to Florence, were shot, and R. L. Hart, a prominent farmer of Winona, about ten miles from here, surrendered himself to the Florence chief of police to-night. The shooting occurred on the train when it was about five miles from this city.

Mr. McClenaghan, a Florence man, had his arm broken by a bullet, while Mr. Hewitt sustained a wound in the hand.

Stories by Hart and McClenaghan are contradictory. Each claims that the other had the pistol, it is understood, and that in a scuffle the gun was fired. It was a stray bullet that hit Mr. Hewitt. Four or five shots were fired.

Hart gave himself up after the train reached Florence. He is one of the most prominent planters in the Winona section of the county.

Mr. McClenaghan says that Mr. Hart's wife got on the train several days ago and stated that she wanted to get off at Winona. The train is not scheduled to stop there, but Mr. McClenaghan stated that he violated the rules of the company by stopping. It is claimed by Mr. Hart that Mr. McClenaghan insulted his wife.

Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Williams and three children arrived in America recently, bringing back stories of extreme hardships in the fortress city of Wiesbaden, Germany, where they were held for six years. A friend of theirs, Mr. Roberts, and his family, also fared badly, as the former was suspected of being a spy. Several times the city was bombed from the air by the Allies, three raids having taken place in one night. It was not until after the armistice was signed that they received correct information from the French troops of the result of the war.
