WOMAN KILLS MAN SHE LOVED.

Then Her Daughter, and Ends All in Committing Suicide.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 2.—Madly in love with a married man, according to the police, Mrs. Mary Frances Dunlop, living on a farm near West Grove, Pa., shot and killed J. L. Eichelberger, the object of her infatuation, as he lay asleep in bed with his wife and infant, early to-day, and then drove to her own home and killed her 11-year-old daughter and herself. Mrs. Dunlop was 36 years old and Eichelberger was 30.

At a coroner's inquest, at which the jury found that Mrs. Dunlop had done the killing, Mrs. Eichelberger testified to her husband's relations with Mrs. Dunlop, and of her having left him. She returned to him only last night. Robert Dunlop said that he was convinced that his wife was insane, as she had several times of late threatened to kill herself. He had been separated from her for the past two years until very recently.

LOOK BEFORE BUYING UP TEXAS

Oil Stocks—Many of These Offered Are Totally Worthless.

Columbia, June 3.—Texas and its surrounding territory is being over-run and milked dry by promoters, especially of oil well stock schemes, and it will pay South Carolinians to invest in none of the stock of such concerns unless the agents of the promotion schemes can produce a State license.

These are the two outstanding things said by W. A. McSwain, State Insurance Commissioner, to-day, on his return to Columbia from a trip to Texas, where he went to get first-hand information regarding the oil well developments which are sending to this State a flood of stock salesmen and "promoters."

The main purpose Mr. McSwain had in going to Texas was to "line up" a number of correspondents with whom to communicate regarding the concerns that apply for licenses to sell their stock in this State. He states that he made arrangements with a number of prominent citizens, and in the future, when stock promoters ask for licenses to sell in this State, information can easily be secured regarding their financial strength and their business standing.

Mr. McSwain stated that Texas is over-worked by oil well promoters. Wells are being bored in all parts of the State, and most of these will never produce oil. He says that he found practically no wells "spouting" oil, as is claimed by so many concerns. More money is spent in boring for oil than is ever made on successful wells, Mr. McSwain believes.

Facts ascertained by the Insurance Commissioner on his Texas trip will probably result in his refusing to license certain companies that are very desirous of selling their stock in this State.

"My advice to the people of the State," said the Insurance Commissioner, "is not to invest their savings in any oil wells or other promotion schemes unless the agents of such concerns can produce licenses issued by the Insurance Department. Other such agents are operating in violation of the law, and the fact that they have no licenses is often proof that they are not safe investments."

ONE OF MARVELS OF THE LAND.

Petrified Forest 60 Miles Square Lies Within Arizona's Painted Desert.

(Detroit News.) Within the stretch of Arizona's Painted Desert of brilliant hues lies one of the marvels of the land—the sixty square miles of petrified forest. There lie, preserved for all time, fallen tree monarchs, millions of years old, turned to rocks.

Mammoth trunks, sometimes five feet in diameter and fifty feet in length, or cracked smoothly into blocks, are transformed into everlasting stone, beautiful in quality and coloring—quartz, agate, chalcedony, jasper and exquisite opal, infinite in the variety of delicate tint and rich shading.

The method petrification by which the giant trees became rock was one of the strange alchemies of nature. Probably the wash of water from hot mineral springs rich in silica was the cause.

The chemical, permeating the tissues of the plant, acted as a hardening agent, preserving the original structure of the tree with astonishing perfection of detail.

Union Officials Abiding by Law.

Chicago, Ill., June 3.—A grand lodge officer has been sent to Atlanta to put striking members of the union back to work, according to E. H. Fitzgerald, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees.

"No strikes are now on with the authorization of this union," said Mr. Fitzgerald, who was attending a session of the United States Railroad Labor Board. "We have our case before this board and are abiding by the law."
