Columbia, June 3.—Texas and its surrounding territory is being over-run and milked dry by promoters, especially of oil well stock schemes, and it will pay South Carolinians to invest in none of the stock of such concerns unless the agents of the promotion schemes can produce a State license.

These are the two outstanding things said by W. A. McSwain, State Insurance Commissioner, to-day, on his return to Columbia from a trip good appetite."
