Will Give Gut No Further Informa-tion Regarding file Schemes.

Boston, Aug. 12.-Charles Ponzi to-day surrendered to the United States marshal, and a w. rrant for his arrest is being prepared. Dis-trict Attorney Gallagher said that Ponzi surfeadered because he felthimself unable to carry out promises he made for the redemption of his notes to-morrow

At the time Pongl gave himself up a hearing was being held before the judge of the municipa' court, who was sitting in chambers of a police application for the arrest of the financier. The hearing was secret.

A creditors' petition asking for the appointment of a receiver for Ponzi was filed in the Federal Court to-

Ponzi halted in the midst of his sensational financial career to-day to rest and recover from the nervous strain caused by the events of the past few days. The man whose "50 per cent in 45 days" investment pro-position has been under investigation by Federal and State officials, and whose principal known depository, the Hanover Trust Company, was closed yesterday by Bank Commissioner Joseph A. Allen, retired to his home at Lexington and denied himself to all callers.

"My nerves can't last forever," Mr. Ponzi said. "I've got to have rest. I am not going to give out any more statements for a while. I am going to keep away from people—I am not even going down-town.

Bank Commissioner Allen announ-ced this afternoon that the capital of the Hanover Trust Company has probably been completely wiped out. The bank was closed yesterday by the commissioner. Ponzi had been a director up to that time.

Ponzi was arrested this afternoon by the Federal authorities, the charge against him being that of using the

mails to defraud.

After his arrest Ponzi issued the following statement:

'I had an agreement with the district attorney to go to-morrow and meet my liabilities with cash. With the closing of the Hanover Trust Co. and with other funds tied up. I find myself unable to do so. I felt it my duty to tell him, and to ask him to detain me."

Saved Alabama Girl from Death. Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 12.—Charles Ponzi, of Boston, who admitted he had served a term in the Atlanta Federal penitentiary, worked in the office of the record keeper while in the penitentiary here and was noted for his quickness at figures and for various plans to make money when he got opportunity, according to A. C. Alderhold, who is the record keeper at the Federal institution.

Alderhold said he could not positively identify Ponzi without Bertillion measurements, but he felt convinced that he was the same man from the pictures and descriptions of him. He described how Ponzi gave skin from his leg to save a young woman in Alabama after he was re-

woman in Alabama after ne was re-leased from the Federal prison.
"We never had a man who was more help to us in the office," Alder-hold stated, "I never knew him to be rattled or flustered, and he never made a mistake. He was always con peculiar scheme cocting some make money.

"One of the finest things he did was after he was released from the prison in 1912. He went to a little mining town in Alabama by the name of Blocton, and the people in that town will never forget him for the deed which he did there to save the life of a young nurse. The young lady had been badly burned by the explosion of a gasoline stove, and the doctors decided that the only way to save her life was to graft skin on the burned place. Ponzi volunteered to let the doctors take skin from his body, and 72 inches were removed hospital two weeks later and the doctors came to him and said that more skin would be necessary. He did not hestitate a moment, but allowed them to take 50 more inches, that time from his back. Citizens of Brocton endeavored to bring the matter before the Carnegie Hero Commission, but nothing ever came of the matter, I believe."
