"COTTON DAY"—SEPTEMBER 20.

Governor Cooper Has So Designated It by Proclamation.

Columbia, Sept. 14.—Special: Monday, Sept. 20th, has been set aside as "Cotton Day" in South Carolina, and on that day farmers and business and professional men in every county in South Carolina will meet at their county seats for the purpose of joining in the South-wide campaign for 40-cent cotton, basis middling, and a prosperous people.

Governor Cooper has issued a proclamation setting aside the day as "Cotton Day" in South Carolina and urging the people of the State to attend the meetings in their respective counties and to take part in them actively.

At each county meeting the following three subjects will constitute the outstanding features of the program:

1. Plans for holding the cotton of the county until fair and just prices can be obtained, together with plans for co-operative marketing.

2. Plans for fully utilizing warehouses and warehouse facilities of the county and for erecting additional warehouses, with special emphasis in the connection on practical plans for financing the crop.

3. Plans for immediately increasing the acreage in fall-sown small grains, also cover crops, as the one wise and certain plan of effecting a reduction in cotton acreage, pledges to this effect to be taken.

A special invitation to the bankers and business men of the State to attend these meetings has been issued by President R. C. Hamer, of the South Carolina division of the American Cotton Association.

FOR COTTON WAREHOUSES.

Meetings Will be Held in Oconee to Discuss and Act Upon Plans.

Meetings will be held (weather permitting) to discuss and act upon plans for the building of community cotton warehouses in conformity with the State Warehouse Act, at the following places on the dates as named below:

South Union—Thursday night at 7.30 o'clock, Sept. 17th.

Cross Roads—Friday night, 7.30 o'clock, Sept. 17th.

Keowee School—Tuesday night, 7.30 o'clock, Sept. 21.

In the opinion of several who attended the meeting of the American Cotton Association in Columbia recently, it is of vital importance that cotton be held off the market until conditions are better. By building warehouses and entering the State system, the lowest rate of insurance is obtained, and also the best security is furnished for obtaining any needed loans.

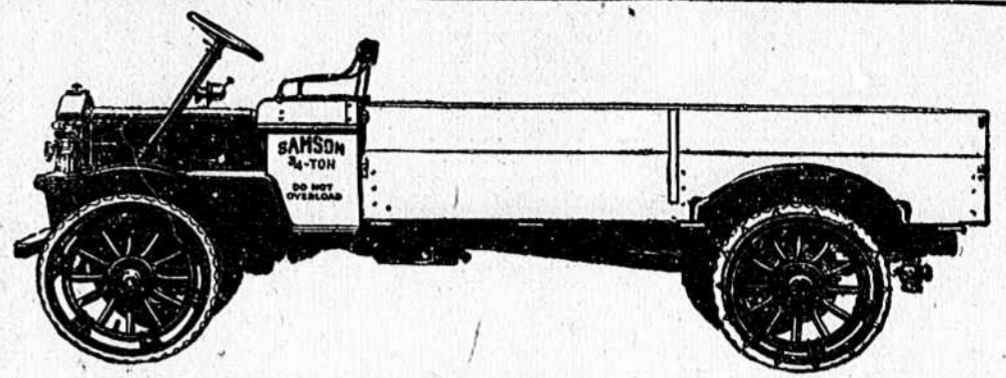
