FOUNDERSHIPS FOR TAMASSEE

Industrial School—Anderson D. A. R. Women Actively at Work.

(Daily Mail, Sept. 22.) At the regular meeting of the Andrew Pickens Chapter, D. A. R., held news that sixteen new founderships for the Tamassee Industrial School for mountain children had been secured among the members of the chapter and a few friends in the community. Previously five founderships had been given by the members of the chapter. A foundership consists of a \$100 gift towards an endowment fund for the Tamassee school, and a movement is on foot among the various chapters of South Carolina to get as large a number of founderships as possible for the endowment of the school.

Perhaps one of the most interesting phases of the matter is the fact that the Andrew Pickens Chapter has given its second foundership, given at this time in memory of the son. graduates of Clemson College who lost their lives in the service during the war. The chapter had already given a foundership in its own name.

This makes a total of 21 founderships which the Andrew Pickens Chapter-rather small in numberis able to report to the State organization, which is fostering the Tamassee school, and the report of Mrs. Bryan to the chapter indicates that several other founderships are to be expected within the next few weeks.
