No More Court This Week.

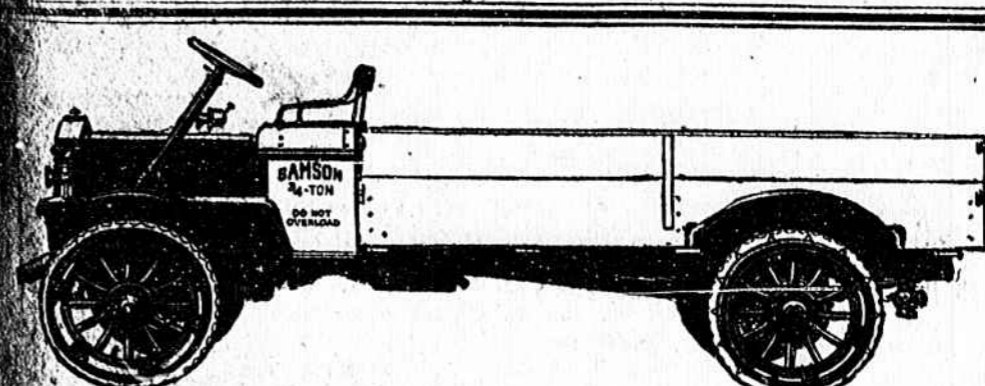

OCCONEE COTTON ASSOCIATION.

Meeting Last Saturday was Largely Attended by Farmers and Others.

A large crowd attended the meeting of the Oconee Cotton Association at Walhalla last Saturday.

J. P. Stribling, president, opened the meeting and introduced G. Cullen Sullivan, Esq., of Anderson, who made a most earnest, instructive and enthusiastic speech in favor of the Export Corporation. All who heard Mr. Sullivan were impressed with the importance and feasibility of this splendid undertaking.

At the close of the meeting subscription blanks were passed around and two thousand and ninety dollars worth of stock in this corporation was subscribed for. The president appointed committees to solicit more subscriptions throughout the county, and it is earnestly hoped that every farmer and business man in Oconee county will take as many shares of this stock as he possibly can. It is confidently believed that this stock will prove a profitable investment for any one, and certainly the country at

large and every business interest will be benefited by the advance in the price of cotton consequent upon the taking over by this corporation of large quantities of the staple for shipment to Europe. Those desiring to purchase shares in the Export Corporation can procure the necessary blanks from their nearest committee or from the president, J. P. Stribling, Richland, or the secretary, J. B. S. Dendy, Walhalla. These gentlemen are president and secretary, respectively, of the Oconee Cotton Association. The shares are only ten dollars each.

"Whereas, it is a matter of com-

mon knowledge that a few misguided people are resorting to and advising others to resort to lawless methods in the destruction of property in their attempts to keep cotton off the market; and,

"Whereas, it is the sense of this meeting that such acts are not to be countenanced by law-abiding citizens: Therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Oconee Cotton Association specifically denounces the burning, or threatened burning, of gins or other property; and that we pledge ourselves to lend our moral, and, if necessary, our financial support for the suppression of any such acts of anarchy among us."
