COURT OF GENERAL SESSIONS.

Number of Cases Disposed Of—True Bills from the Grand Jury.

The Court of General Sessions for Oconee convened Monday, Judge Gary presiding. Monday and yesterday the Court was at work continuously and worked with a view to disposing of as much of the criminal business on the docket as possible.

The new Solicitor, Leon W. Harris, Esq., of Anderson, was at his post, and it is evident from his work that he is going to prove all that the public can wish in the matter of giving careful and painstaking thought and labor in the matter of seeing that violators of the law are given adequate punishment where he can justly convict. Mr. Harris is an Oconeean by birth, and he has a host of warm friends in our county.

Stenographer Clyde Smith was, as usual, at his post, ready at all times to record accurately the proceedings of the various trials.

State vs. Jack Hughs—violation of prohibition law. Pleaded guilty. Sentenced to three months on county chain gang, or like period in State penitentiary, or pay fine of \$100.

State vs. Joe Evans—larceny. Defendant pleaded guilty. Sentenced to three months on county chain gang or like period in State penitentiary.

State vs. Clarence Mulwee—violation of prohibition law. Pleaded guilty. Sentenced to three months on county chain gang, or pay fine of \$100. Upon payment of \$50 rest of sentence suspended during good behavior.

State vs. Arthur Cox—assault and battery with intent to kill and carrying concealed weapons. Continued.

State vs. Frank Shed, Ben Thrift, Paul Cox and DeWitt Powell—manufacturing intoxicating liquors. Not pressed as to DeWitt Powell.

State vs. F. C. Summerall—murder. Not guilty.

State vs. Dora Walker—disposing of property under lien. Continued.

State vs. John Stephens—assault and battery with intent to kill and carrying concealed weapons. Continued.

State vs. Will Harrison—murder. Guilty—recommended to mercy of the Court. Sentenced to life imprisonment in State penitentiary.

Court Adjourned.

Tuesday afternoon the jurors were all dismissed and Court was adjourned sine die. Solicitor Harris was able to get off on the evening train and Judge Gary left this morning at 7.10 o'clock.

S. C. Ginnings 278,460 Bales Short.

The cotton ginning report for the State of South Carolina shows that, up to Oct. 18, of the 1920 crop, there had been ginned 562,127 bales. The ginnings up to the same date in 1919 totalled 840,587, thus showing the ginnings in this State to be, for the present season, 278,460 bales short of last year.

Apple Grove Orchards Win. Apple Grove Orchards, owned by D. E. Good, near Walhalla, won again this year the most prominent place in the "King of Fruits" exhibits at the State Fair. Three different varieties—Stayman Winesap, Ben Davis and Shockley—of five boxes each, were on display, with both the blue and red ribbons pinned on the exhibit, while the single box of Stayman Winesaps won the prize for the best individual box. These three prizes netted \$50 in cash prizes also. "Oh, I didn't know apples like these could be grown in South Carolina," some were heard to exclaim. Yes, they can be grown here in the Blue Ridge mountains just as well as all that we need, is the determination to grow them and give them the care and pruning, spraying and cultivation—or about one-half the attention we give to cotton.

More Pig Club Prizes. W. H. McJunkin, a Duroc breeder of the South Union section, offers a fine young Duroc pig as a prize in the Pig Club, and J. B. Landslide FOR HARDING

COX AND DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE CONCEDE SWEEPING VICTORY FOR THE REPUBLICANS.

Harding Said to Be Assured of 275 Votes in the Electoral College.

Reports from the election in the nation indicate a sweeping victory for the Republican Presidential nominee, Warren G. Harding, of Ohio. Not only is a Republican victory assured for President, but Congressional and Senatorial elections indicate material gains in Congress for the Republicans that will give them a safe majority in the Legislative branch of the government.

In the Presidential election Harding is conceded to have carried the following States:

Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Washington, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

M. F. Ansel Elected Judge.

News comes from Greenville county that the new County Court proposition has been endorsed by the people by a vote of about ten to one. It will be of interest to Oconeeans to note that Ex-Governor Martin F. Ansel, "a former Walhalla boy," has been elected as Judge of the new County Court. He will be commissioned and the court constituted as soon as it can be legally done.
