ineet, Warren G. Harding, of Ohio. Not only is a Republican victory assured for President, but Congressional and Senatorial elections indi-

cate material gains in Congress for the Republicans that will give them a safe majority in the Legislative branch of the government. In the Presidential election Hard-

ing is conceded to have carried the following States: Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Illi-

nois, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Washington, Wis-consin and Wyoming.
