



### USING AEROPLANES AT TARGET PRACTICE.

All our latest warships carry their own aeroplanes for scouting and spotting purposes. The plane in the above illustration is just leaving the deck of a ship for a spin, during which the observer snapped the pictures of a division of battleships' shots landing around the target. It is not very difficult for him to see that they were all pretty close. The platform from which the plane starts on its cruise can be erected in less than an hour, so that the fighting efficiency of the ship is in no way lessened by having this tremendous aid to one's vision on board.



### CLEMSON COMMISSARY-KITCHEN

Damaged by Fire—Loss Considerable—Cadets Earn a Holiday.

Clemson College, Jan. 18.—Fire this morning partially destroyed the kitchen and commissary at Clemson College. The loss is estimated at \$25,000, fully covered by insurance, which was carried with the Sinking Fund Commission of the State. The kitchen and commissary are attached to Barracks No. 1, the largest of a group of three dormitory buildings. For a while this entire group was threatened, but the splendid fire-fighting of the corps of cadets confined the conflagration to its original limits. There were no accidents.

While much of the kitchen equipment was damaged or destroyed and a considerable quantity of supplies burned, breakfast was served this morning as usual. A holiday was declared in recognition of the efficient work of the cadets, but otherwise there will be no interruption in the schedule. A temporary roof will be constructed over the kitchen and commissary, and steps will be taken at once to replace such equipment as is not usable. The tile floors and the refrigerating plant were not damaged. The origin of the fire has not yet been determined.

### WHO WILL GET RUSSIA'S MONEY

That is Question at Present Puzzling the United States Authorities.

Washington, Jan. 20.—The United States owes \$1,400,000 to Russia, but is unable to determine to whom the money should go, the State Department announced recently, commenting on a report recently handed out by the publicity department of the French foreign office saying that this money belonged to Gen. Wrangel.

The State Department explained that during the war the United States Shipping Board had taken over some vessels belonging to the Russian volunteer fleet, valued at \$1,400,000. It had been arranged to pay this money to Kerensky, but his government fell. The State Department has offered the money to Ambassador Bakhmeteff, who came to the United States as the Kerensky representative, and who is still recognized by this government, but he refused to accept the money.

The United States acknowledges its debt, but does not know to whom the money should go, as the vessels were owned by a czaristic corporation, the State Department explains.

### Said He Bought Protection.

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 20.—Federal prohibition enforcement officers had under way today an investigation of statements said to have been made by Ivy Kassell, of Savannah, that he and 75 others engaged in illicit distilling had been paying for protection. Special investigators from the Washington headquarters were said to be en route here to sift the matter. Kassell was arrested last week charged with making whiskey.

Jesse E. Mercer, State prohibition enforcement officer, in a statement made here today regarding the situation in Savannah, said: "The Federal investigators who are going to Savannah will find the charges a thousand times true. They will find more than the city police guilty of having part in the ugliest situation that can be imagined."

### ARMENIAN GIRLS WERE SOLD

As Wives After Being Brought to America, According to Report.

Fresno, Cal., Jan. 19.—How six beautiful Armenian women were brought to the United States and sold was disclosed Monday by Geo. W. Moore, United States immigration commissioner. Haroutian Selvian, a wealthy rancher, returned from Armenia recently, bringing seven pretty women. Selvian married one of the women, according to the commissioner, and bartered the others to wealthy members of the Armenian colony, just as in the slave marts of the Orient.

When Selvian arrived in Fresno with the women he announced that he had married one of them and would sell the others, so Commissioner Moore said his investigation disclosed. The news spread rapidly, and there was lively bidding among members of the colony.

One woman, the most beautiful of the sextette, was sold for \$2,000. The lowest price was \$400. One of the girls, possessed of less good looks than the others, is being held by Selvian for a favorable bid.

Selvian told the authorities that the women were gathered from refugee camps at Samson, Turkey, some of them from hospitals, and that he had brought them with him because he had been given money by friends at Fresno to pay the transportation of brides to America, he to make the selection.

## Christ—The Subject of All Scripture

TEXT.—Search the Scriptures . . . they are they which testify of me.—John 5:39.

The only absolutely true history in all the world is found within the pages of the Bible.



Wherever Scripture touches history, unlike the historians of the world, it touches it with a true hand. The historians of the world are naturally unable to look at history from any but prejudiced eyes. The very perfections of their national heroes, as recorded in their writings, leave us with the impression that these were supermen and almost incapable of wrongdoing. But we know that they were men of like passions with us, however unlike they appear on the pages of the histories. But when the Holy Spirit wrote history, though it be the history of a David, He told us all the truth, and the man David stands before us as he really was. While the Bible contains the only wholly reliable history in all the world, its object is not merely to record history, but to set before the reader the person of Jesus Christ.

The only true philosophy is found recorded on the pages of the Bible. All the philosophies of the world, unable to rise higher than their source, can have no fuller message than "Man, know thyself." But because of inherent inability, man alone can never know himself nor come to the knowledge which tells him whence he came or whither he goes; he continues on his way like a ship without rudder or pilot, knowing neither the port from whence he sailed nor the harbor to which he is bound, and the reason for his being upon the sea of life at all remains an unsolved enigma to him.

But the philosophy which comes from the Bible begins by saying, "Man, know God," and then graciously proceeds to reveal God to man. In that revelation man may know both the God who speaks and himself besides. But while the Bible contains the only true philosophy in the world its object is not to give man mere philosophy, but to bring to man the knowledge of God as revealed fully in the supreme subject of Scripture, Jesus Christ.

Again, the only true moral code in the world is found within the Bible. Like the philosophies of the world, the moral codes formed by man rise no higher than himself, and have in view man's relation to man only; they do not deal with man's relation to God. But the moral code of the Bible begins with man's relation to God, followed by man's relation to man. The first and great commandment is, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart," and the second is like unto it, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself" (Matt. 22:37-39). But while it contains the only complete moral code in the world, its subject is not that merely, but is Jesus Christ.

Without Christ the Bible would never have been written. He is the Key which unlocks all its mysteries; the Light that reveals all its hidden excellencies. The Bible is like the temple of which the Psalmist says, "Every whit speaks of His glory" (Psalms 29:9). Jesus said: "Ye search the Scriptures for in them ye think ye have eternal life, and they are they which testify of me" (John 5:39). "Had ye believed Moses ye would have believed me, for he wrote of me" (John 5:46). "And beginning at Moses and all the prophets He expounded unto them in all the Scriptures the things concerning Himself" (Luke 24:27). "All things must be fulfilled which were written in the law of Moses and in the prophets and in the Psalms concerning Me" (Luke 24:44).

When "holy men of God wrote as they were moved upon by the Holy Spirit" (I Peter 1:21) they wrote of Jesus Christ. From the beginning to the end of the Book, through the histories and the prophecies, the poetry and the Psalms, the one radiant object presented to our view in type, symbol, ceremony and prediction is the Lord Jesus Christ. He is the supreme subject of all the Scriptures, and we read our Bibles to little profit if we fail to find Him there as we study its pages. But finding Him, we will come to know the truth that God would have us learn for our comfort and profit, and for our growth in grace and spiritual power. As we read the Bible, depending upon the Holy Spirit to take of the things of Christ and show them unto us (John 16:14) we will come to know, in ever-increasing blessing and delight, the Lord Jesus Christ as our savior, Friend and Lord. As He is the supreme subject of the Bible, to know Him should be the supreme object of our Bible study.

### WOULD PROHIBIT DOG-EATING

Custom Common Among the Igorots Is Declared to Be Undesirable for Many Reasons.

Those who remember the article in this magazine a short time ago telling of the cruelties connected with the killing of dogs for food among the Igorots, says Our Dumb Animals, will be glad to know that it has aroused sufficient interest to cause the Manila Daily Bulletin to say, according to a clipping we have just received:

"The office of the Department of the Interior is constantly receiving from persons in the United States, mostly women, letters protesting against dog-eating in the mountain province among the Igorots, it was declared by Secretary Kalaw of the department. All of them, he said, urge that in the interests of civilization and better and higher mode of living, a law should be passed by the Philippine legislature prohibiting the sale and the use of dogs as food material.

"Aside from the fact that the act of eating dogs is highly undesirable, the letters state, it is very inhumane. The Igorots, they state, like to eat lean dogs and that the more bony they are, the more palatable they taste to the Igorots. Consequently, when a dog is bought in the dog market at Bagulo or at any other place, it is left to starve for many days before it is eaten, the communications declare.

"When asked if the passage of a law prohibiting the sale and the eating of dogs by the Igorots was in order, Secretary Kalaw declared that it might be done in an indirect manner."

### SWORD WORTHY OF OWNER

Blade Worn by Miles Standish Has Been Traced to the Time of the Crusades.

Among the relics of the Pilgrims that may be seen when visitors through the old town of Plymouth for the tercentenary observances few are more interesting than the sword of Miles Standish. It may be seen in Pilgrim hall.

It is a Damascus blade and presumably came into the possession of the Pilgrim captain from someone whose ancestors had brought it from the Crusades.

It bears several curious inscriptions, which waited until June, 1831, to be translated. Then Prof. James Rose-dale of Jerusalem went with a band of Arabs to America's most important shrine and found that the carved characters belonged to different dates—some in Cufic and very old.

He was only able to translate one of a later period, in Arabic. The words given here show that its spirit was quite appropriate to the spirit of the Pilgrims:

"With peace God ruled his Slaves. And with the judgments of His arms He troubled the Mighty of the wicked."

### Rock Many Religious Associations.

A report on the Dome of the Rock of Jerusalem is shortly to be published and will be of great interest to the Mohammedan world. It may not be generally known that this place is the third in sanctity of all the sanctuaries of Islam, and indeed for a short period it actually formed the Kibla toward which all Moslems prostrated themselves in prayer. Among the more important religious associations of this rock we may mention that it was here that David and Solomon were called to repentance, and on account of a vision David chose this site for his temple. From this same spot Mohammed ascended to the Seventh Heaven after his night journey from Mecca, and lastly it is to be the scene of the Great Judgment. The historical associations are not less striking, and such famous names as Omar, Abd-el-Malek, Saladin and Suleiman are all connected with the rock.—From the Zanzibar Gazette.

### SIFT OUT THE UNDESIRABLES.

We Should Take Stock and See What Is Best for the Future.

With hordes of alien peoples eagerly awaiting opportunity for admission to this country we should at once adopt adequate measures to sift out the undesirables and the vicious. There are from 15,000,000 to 17,000,000 aliens here now—about one-seventh of our entire population. Before we add to this enormous aggregate we may well call a halt so that we can take stock, see where we stand, and determine on the best course for the future. The Johnson bill, now before the Senate committee on immigration, provides for the stoppage of immigration for a year. It should be passed and become the law of the land.

In some quarters it is urged that America is merely a trustee for the world, and that we have no moral right to shut our doors to the oppressed of other lands. A man having a home for his family may feel that, to a certain extent, he is a trustee to help care for others, but if he throws open his house to the weak and vicious, and those who preach false doctrines as to family life, he will destroy his own home, and thus make it impossible for him in the future to safeguard his family and to use his home as a point from which to radiate influences for good.

America represents a great home. We can use its resources and its opportunities as trustees for the benefit of the world, but if we throw it wide open to all the vicious and the inefficient and the beggars of the world, and those who teach doctrines false to our sense of government, and permit aliens who are alien in their thought and word and life to our country to take possession of our home, we will prove recreant to our trusteeship; we will destroy our civilization, and this great country, the last hope of human liberty, civil and religious, will go down in ruin.

Every consideration of prudence and safety calls for the passage of the Johnson bill.

### Fifty-Seven Russians Returning.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—Fifty-seven Russians to-day are carrying small American flags—and, they declare, the principles of American freedom they gained in this country—back to their home land, although they voluntarily renounced the American form of government for the Soviet. They are not, however, in sympathy with Bolshevism, they say, but are returning to Russia because they could not bring their wives, sweethearts or families to America.

They are scheduled to arrive in Halifax, N. S., to-night to embark for Hamburg, Germany, thence overland to Eydkaunen, on the Lithuanian border, and on to Soviet Russia.

There was only one woman in the party, who was returning with her husband to her parents in Moscow. She came to America eight years ago to be married, and is now accompanying her husband back to their home.
