

GERMANY ACCEPTS THE TERMS

Fixed by the Allied Nations—The Announcement Brings Cheers.

London, May 11.—Germany's unconditional acceptance of the Entente reparations ultimatum was delivered to Mr. Lloyd George by M. St. Hamer, German ambassador to Great Britain, here to-day.

Mr. Lloyd George announced in the House of Commons this afternoon Germany's complete acceptance of the Allied demands, and his announcement was greeted with prolonged cheers.

Dr. St. Hamer handed the German reply to the premier at 11 o'clock this morning, and Mr. Lloyd George immediately telegraphed the news to all the governments concerned.

Text of the Reply.
The text of the reply as delivered to the prime minister began as follows:

"Mr. Prime Minister: In accordance with instructions just received I am commanded by my government in accordance with the decision of the Reichstag, and with reference to the resolutions of the Allied powers of May 5, 1921, in the name of the new German government to declare the following:

"The German government is fully resolved, first, to carry out, without reserve or condition, its obligations as defined by the reparations commission.

"Second, to accept and carry out without reserve or conditions the guarantees in respect of those obligations prescribed by the reparations commission.

"Third, to carry out, without reserve or delay, the measures of military, naval and aerial disarmament notified to the German government by the Allied governments in their note of Jan. 29, 1921, those over-due to be completed at once, and the remainder by the prescribed date.

"Fourth, to carry out, without reserve or delay, the trial of war criminals and to execute the other unfulfilled portions of the treaty in the first paragraph of the note of the Allied governments of May 5.

"I ask the Allied powers to take note immediately of this declaration. (Signed) 'St. Hamer.'

Mr. Lloyd George in giving the terms of the reply to the House of Commons, said: "This is complete acceptance of every demand."

Discord at Washington.
Washington, May 11.—Reports already are being received at the State Department of developments in the conference of ambassadors and the reparations commission from Ambassadors Wallace and Roland W. Boyden, respectively, the unofficial representatives of the American government with those bodies at Paris. With the arrival yesterday in London of Ambassador Harvey similar reports are expected from the Allied Supreme Council, with which he will sit as the personal representative of President Harding.

Although the character of the information received from Paris has not been made public, officials have expressed pleasure with the operation of the system. An indication of some Senate opposition to the arrangement, however, appeared yesterday, with the introduction of a resolution by Senator LaFollette, Republican, of Wisconsin, condemning President Harding for appointing American representatives to the Allied councils in Europe, and proposing a declaration by the Senate "that it is contrary to American ideals and traditions for the government of the United States to participate in any manner" in such councils.

At the same time assurances were given the President that there was little criticism among Republican Senators for the appointments, and the position of a small number was not serious.

Paris Newspaper Comment.
Paris, May 11.—Newspapers of this city professed this morning to see in Germany's acceptance of the Allied reparations demands proof that Germany complies only to the argument of force. At the same time they expressed doubts as to her fulfillments of her undertakings.

"German statesmen," said the Figaro, "made up their minds only at the last moment, but finally decided to accept in principle. As for the execution of her agreement, we will see what time will bring."

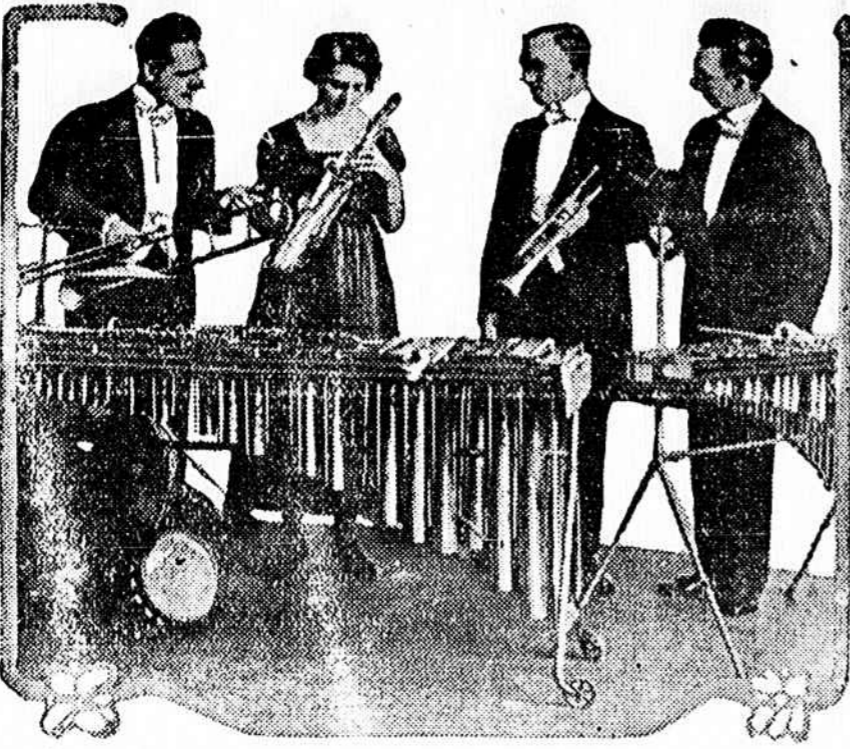
"Let the German government pay and disarm," declared the Journal. "Otherwise, like all faithless debtors, she will have only herself to blame if she finds herself sold up."

The Echo de Paris remarked: "The Germans in bowing to the ultimatum, have the air of complying to what is asked of them, but no one beneficently may deny us the right to go ahead upon the first back-sliding of our adversary."

Harding Discusses South.

Washington, May 13.—Reappointment of representation in Republican National Conventions was discussed with President Harding yesterday by the sub-committee appointed by the Republican National Committee, consisting of Postmaster General Hays, the committee chairman, Clarence B. Miller, its secretary, and Representative Sleep, of Virginia. It was said that no conclusions had been reached, although recommendations are to be formulated for submission to the National Committee meeting next month.

Southern representation is particularly under consideration, but the sub-committee also is giving attention to a proposal to increase the number of delegates allotted to States having unusually large Republican majorities. In preparation for its decision the sub-committee has collected detailed statistics on the Republican vote for years past in every Congressional district.

REDUCE LARGE WASTE IN CELERY SHIPMENT

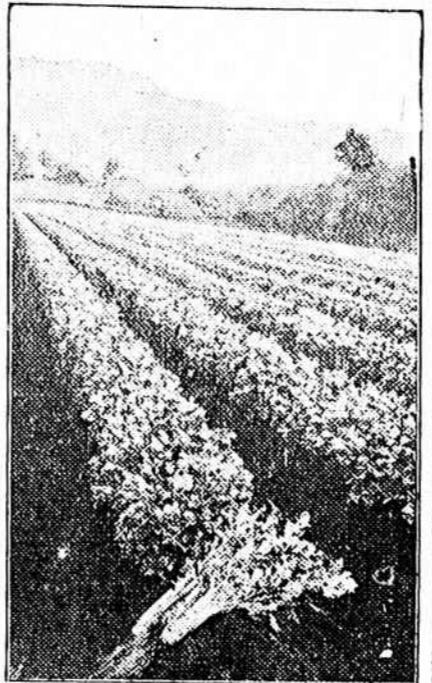
Transactions Indefinite Because of Lack of Grading

Establishment of Two Grades of Rough Product Would Enable Dealers and Receivers to Work on More Profitable Basis.

"Rough celery" is the market term applied to celery that is taken from the field and packed in crates with little or no trimming. Transactions in rough celery always are more or less indefinite, because of the lack of grading. The bureau of markets, United States Department of Agriculture, has been conducting investigations in the celery markets of New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Ohio, to learn if it will be practicable to establish standard celery grades. In 1919, the railroads reported that 1,900 carloads of celery had been moved from the states mentioned, and that most of it was shipped in the rough.

The establishment of two grades of rough celery would eliminate much waste and would enable dealers and

receivers to place their orders and select on a more definite basis. The first grade, as customarily is the specialty crop, are not getting the recognition, would include sound stock that is practically free from pithy stalks, stalks that have gone to seed or are damaged from disease or insects. A minimum diameter for this grade of 1 1/2 inches would be fixed. The second grade would include any celery that did not meet the requirements for the first grade.

SHIPPING TO SMALL CITIES

As There Is Little Opening for Carlot Shipments, It Is Advisable to Mix the Produce.

In small cities there is little opening for carlot shipments of fruits or vegetables. Shippers of carloads should never consign to such markets unless previous arrangements have been made with a dealer, say specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. The small cities are easily oversupplied and only at certain times offer an opening for a carload of any kind of perishable produce. Often a mixed carload is more salable in such markets than a car filled with one kind. The most reliable plan is to load and ship the car according to requirements previously ascertained from the dealer who handles the sale. It is still better to dispose of the car, f. o. b. shipping point. This may be done when the dealer is in need of the supply and when the shipper is able to convince the buyer that his guarantee is good regarding the grade and quality of the produce.

STRONG SEED IS REQUISITE

That of Alfalfa, When Properly Matured, Has Clear, Light Golden Color, With Green Cast.

Good seed is the first requisite in getting a stand of any crop. Alfalfa seed should not only be of good quality and strong in vitality, but it should be clean and free from soil and weed seeds. Properly matured seed of alfalfa has a clear, light golden color, with a faint greenish cast. Immature seeds are greener and seed which has been bleached or heated becomes discolored. Brown or blackened seeds are likely to be dead or low in vitality. Greenish colored seed, if not too shrunken, may germinate well. Prefer plump, heavy seed; badly shrunken seed, even though it may sprout, will produce weak plants.

INTRODUCTION OF MILO CROP

First Grown in This Country About 1882 and Was Not Uniform in Height or Maturity.

Milo was grown first in this country about 1882. It was not uniform in maturity and in height, most of the plants being tall. Standard milo is a direct descendant of the original type, reduced by systematic selection to a uniform height of from 5 to 6 feet under dry land conditions.

Thick Spacing of Cotton. The Second Apple Spray.

Clemson College, May 13.—Much interest is being shown this season, says Prof. C. P. Blackwell, agronomist, in the question of the spacing of cotton for boll weevil conditions. Many inquiries are being received by the agronomy division as to the best spacing of cotton. Prof. Blackwell's answer to such inquiries is that the observation and experiment of our agronomists are in harmony with the experiments from Mississippi and other States to the effect that thick spacing is best.

"We have gotten larger yields from thick spacing, and we believe that it is quite universally true throughout the country that thick spacing is best. We believe that the farmers generally have not been leaving their cotton thick enough, and we have for several years been recommending thick spacing of cotton.

The Progressive Farmer states that 84 farmers have written for publication of their experiences in spacing cotton. Of these 77 have found that thick spacing increased their yield, one is still experimenting, one gives his opinion without experimenting, and five report better results with thin spacing. These farmers who have conducted experiments of this kind have in nearly all cases gotten best results from thick spacing.

First Cotton Arrives in Germany.

Bremen, Germany, May 11.—The first 150 bales of American cotton, donated to the German children's fund by Americans, has arrived here from Galveston, Texas. The cotton will be converted into clothes for the children. It is reported here that more than 2,300 bales of cotton have already been collected and are ready for shipment to Germany.

DAMAGE FROM FOREST FIRES.

Hundred Thousand Acres in Florida Swept by Flames.

Ocala, Fla., May 12.—Federal and State authorities began yesterday an investigation of reports that fires which during the past week swept 60,000 acres of the Ocala National Forest Reserve and 40,000 acres of private property adjoining, were set with malicious intent. The fires, which began a week ago Sunday, burned themselves out yesterday, leaving in their wake thousands of acres of charred timber and the charred bodies of thousands of animals and birds. In some sections the bodies of deer, raccoons and rabbits were scattered all around, according to persons who visited the scene.

One report received here was that one of the first fires was set for the purpose of starting a conflagration and then receiving pay for assisting in extinguishing the flames. According to this report the fire got beyond the control of those who were responsible for it. The first fire began early Sunday afternoon, and by night had covered a distance of ten miles. Other fires broke out the next day in other parts of the reserve and burned without interruption until there was nothing in their paths to consume.

Tokio, Japan, May 19.—Conditions in the interior of Siberia are pitiable, with nearly all the people there in dire need of clothing, food and medicine. It is said that many people in Siberia who have not had any new clothing, or ample clothing to keep them warm during the last six years, are now in a most pitiable condition. Many were helped by the American Red Cross, but as the Red Cross left the interior in December, 1919, they have suffered through two hard winters since then with inadequate clothing, food and medical supplies.
