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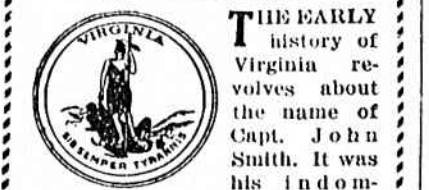

THE EARLY history of Virginia revolves about the name of Capt. John Smith. It was his indomitable spirit which enabled the settlement at Jamestown to survive the privations and difficulties that encompassed it during those first years.

THEY'RE NOT APPOINTED YET.

Even Gates and Cochran Must Wait Republican Developments.

Columbia, May 19.—Advices received in Columbia yesterday from Washington quote Republican leaders as saying that neither A. A. Gates of Greenville, nor John R. Cochran, Jr., of Anderson, have been appointed postmaster of their respective towns, and they will not be appointed right away, if at all.

Joseph W. Tolbert, of Greenwood, is in Washington, so say these telegraphic advices, looking after his chances for the Republican pie distribution, but it is stated in the telegrams from Washington that the Republican leaders are looking for a new leader in this State—a man whose record is not connected with past Republican politics in the State.

It is stated that such a leader has not yet been decided upon. The plans for the new Republican party in this State are to take some shape at an early date, it is said.

Episcopals Divide the State.

Columbia, May 19.—The Episcopal Diocesan Council of South Carolina, in session in Sumter to-day, voted to divide the diocese into two sections.

Bishop Guerry will remain in the lower half of the State, while Bishop Coadjuter Finley will have oversight of the upper half of the State.

TAFT PROMINENTLY MENTIONED

As Possible Successor to Late Chief Justice White.

Washington, May 19.—The choice of a successor to Edward Douglass White as Chief Justice of the United States was one of the most widely discussed subjects to-day in official circles of the capital.

One of the first suggestions to come to the surface in private discussions of the subject among members of the Senate, which must confirm the nomination, was that Mr. Taft had disqualified himself by insisting, when he was Chief Executive, that no man over sixty years of age should ever be appointed to the highest court.

All indications pointed to considerable delay in making the appointment. The general impression was that nothing would be done prior to the reconvening of the Court after its summer recess, which will begin June 6.

Mr. Taft is known to have been long under consideration by President Harding as a possible Chief Justice. The former President has several times declared that one of his great regrets was that fortune had cast his service in the executive chair and not in the judicial branch of the government.

CHIEF JUSTICE WHITE IS DEAD.

Failed to Rally After Operation—76 Years Old—Noted Jurist.

Washington, May 19.—Edward Douglass White, Chief Justice of the United States, died at 2 o'clock this morning at a hospital, where he submitted to an operation last Friday. He was 76 years of age.

The Chief Justice had been unconscious since late Tuesday afternoon, when acute dilation of the heart occurred. Up to that time the attending physicians had hope for a rapid recovery after an operation for bladder trouble.

After this unexpected relapse the physicians had not expected the Chief Justice to live through that night. Rev. Father S. J. Creeden, of Georgetown University, administered the last sacrament during the early evening. A number of the immediate family were summoned to the bedside.

Death was said to be due directly to complications which developed after the operation.

Justice McKenna and others of Mr. White's associates in the Supreme Court called at the hospital when it became known that his condition was serious, but did not enter the room, as the Chief Justice was unconscious.

Negro Increase 3.5; White, 20.5.

Washington, May 20.—The negro population of South Carolina in 1920 numbered 864,719, according to statistics made public yesterday by the census bureau. This was an increase of 3.5 per cent for the ten years.

The whites numbered 818,538, showing an increase for the ten-year period of 20.5 per cent.

South Carolina's foreign born white population was placed at 6,041 or 0.4 per cent of the total population, which was the same as ten years before.

There were 838,293 males and 845,431 females, or a ratio of 99.2 males to 100 females.

How Germany Will Pay.

Paris, May 18.—Germany's first payment, of the equivalent of 150,000,000 gold marks, to the reparations commission will be made up as follows:

3,000,000 pounds sterling (\$11,675,000.) 22,000,000 French francs. 3,000,000 Swiss francs. 12,000,000 Belgian francs. 2,000,000 Dutch florins. 6,500,000 Danish crowns. 3,000,000 Swedish crowns. 3,500,000 Norwegian crowns. 8,500,000 pesetas. 10,000,000 gold marks.

Dog Carries Airplane's Message.

Rantoul, Ill., May 20.—"Bing," a fox terrier, made a descent of 1,500 feet in a parachute from an airplane at Chanute Field to-day. When Bing landed he worked himself free from his harness, overcame another dog set to prevent his outward journey, and ran to headquarters with a message carried in a pouch suspended from his neck.

SOUTH CAROLINA ODD FELLOWS

Hold Session in Columbia—Next Session Will Be in Spartanburg.

Representatives of the various Odd Fellow lodges of South Carolina met in the Palmetto Hall on May 12th in annual State convention of the Grand Lodge.

An important departure from the usual custom was the creation of three divisions in the State to be under the supervision of officers of the Grand Lodge. The Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master and Grand Warder each will be at the head of a division and will be expected to visit every lodge in the territory before the next Grand Lodge session.

Spartanburg was selected for the next convention over Rock Hill, Union, Anderson and Columbia.

W. E. Hammond, of Greenville, was re-elected secretary of the board. Frank J. Tripp, or Pelzer, was re-elected treasurer.
