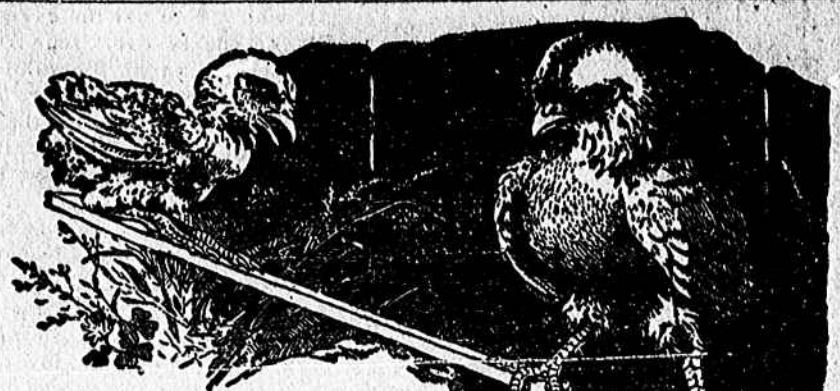

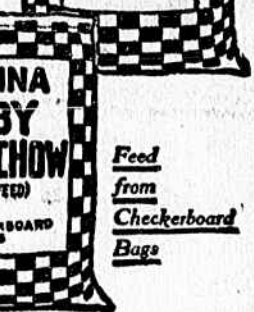
—Friends of Frank W. DuPre, formerly of Walhalla, but for several years a resident of West Virginia, will regret to learn that he recently received quite serious injury at Rainelle, W. Va., where he was engaged as superintendent of a large lumber plant. Mr. DuPre, on Friday, Jan. 27th, was accosted in the plant by a man who had been discharged from the works, the man requesting that he be put back to work in his old position. He having been discharged on the order of his foreman, Mr. DuPre, as superintendent, refused to send him back to his old position, but assured the man that if he could find work for him in some other department that he would be glad to do so. The two separated, and a short while afterward the man reappeared in the works, came up to Mr. DuPre and felled him by striking him from the back with a piece of gas pipe. After Mr. DuPre was down he was struck several times about the head and face with the same piece of pipe with which he had been knocked unconscious. He was unconscious about four hours. His injuries are a fracture on the head, both jaws broken and one jaw bone dislocated at the upper "hinge," to say nothing of a number of ugly wounds about the head and face, which are not considered serious. Mr. DuPre has been in a hospital most of the time since the attack was made on him. Word during the past week is to the effect that it is thought that his condition is somewhat improved, though he is by no means nearing recovery. He is being very carefully watched by physicians in the hope of preventing complications that might easily arise out of his precarious condition. Mr. DuPre is a son of Mr. and Mrs. E. M. DuPre, who live near Walhalla. A number of years ago he married Miss Jones, of Walhalla, who has the sympathy of many friends here in her anxiety over the condition of her husband. We join with other friends of Mr. DuPre in the hope that he may soon be quite himself again.
