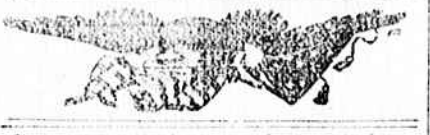

TO TEST STATE INCOME TAX LAW

Several Irregularities Charged in the Matter of Its Passage.

Columbia, May 10.—The State income tax law got into the courts yesterday on the allegation that it is unconstitutional, and the Supreme Court, assuming jurisdiction, set the 15th of this month as the date for the hearing of arguments in the petition of the Santee Mills, of Orangeburg, for a restraining order against the State Tax Commission, to prevent them from proceeding with the collection of the tax.

REV. MORGAN SUCCEEDS DODGE

As Pastor of the Anderson Congregational Church—To Seminary.

(Anderson Daily Mail.) Rev. Frank C. Morgan, son of the world-famed Dr. G. Campbell Morgan, of London, England, has accepted the call of the Pilgrim Congregational church of this city and succeeds Dr. D. Witherspoon Dodge as pastor of the church.

Dr. Dodge, who founded the local Congregational church and during the past few months has taught at the seminary in connection with his work here, has accepted a permanent position with the Atlanta Seminary as professor of Old and New Testament History, Greek and Christian evidences, as well as having taken up the pastorate of four Congregational churches near Barnesville Ga.

Rev. Morgan is no stranger in Anderson, having occupied the local pulpit on several occasions in the absence of Dr. Dodge, who was pastor of the church at that time. Each time he has drawn large audiences. He was called to the local church some time ago, when Dr. Dodge resigned.
