TEXT AND PRETEXT.

The Meaning of Motherhood.

(M. Ashby Jones, D.D., in Atlanta Sunday Constitution, May 14.)
When we come to the annual celebration of Mothers' Day the preacher wants a sure enough text. Where could one be found of rarer beauty or more real significance than this picture given by one of the biographers of Jesus:

"There was standing by the cross of Jesus, His mother. When Jesus therefore saw His mother and the disciple standing by, whom He loved, He saith unto His mother, 'Woman, behold thy Son.' Then saith He to the disciple, 'Behold thy mother.'"

Here is humanity at its best. A mother who could bear a son to die for others would of course be found near the cross in this hour of His deepest need. That she could rear such a son might be explained on the ground of His unique origin. But that she would be willing to give up such a son for the service of humanity is the supreme triumph of motherhood. Here she rears the standard of womanhood to its loftiest limits. That soft sentimentality which sings its selfishness in the song, "I Did Not Rear My Boy to Be a Soldier," could never climb the heights of Golgotha and stand by a redeeming cross. Here motherhood rises responsive to the noblest appeal.

The Significance of the Feast.

Then there is the other side of the picture. There was conferred upon John that day the highest honor ever bestowed upon a man. Jesus gave into his keeping the most sacred of all trusts, with the words "My Mother" and "Thy Mother." It is said that from that hour the home of John became the home of Mary. But I believe we shall miss the deeper meaning of His words if we do not clearly understand that, as was His wont, He was speaking to a world of men through this man. Here manhood in this highest and holiest moment commends motherhood to the chivalric care of men as the most sacred obligation. The significance of the scene comes with a profound solemn meaning when we can hear Jesus saying to the men of to-day, as He points to the womanhood of the world, "Behold thy Mother." And it is something infinitely more than the mere appeal to physical strength to protect physical weakness. It is an appeal for the actual preservation of the human race. It calls for the conservation of those faculties and forces by which civilization has come thus far, and by which alone we can ever hope to reach the highest levels of life.

How many of the most familiar experiences are the profoundest mysteries? Stand before any mother and her babe, and you are standing in the presence of the miracle of creation. Look for a moment from the face of the child, with its well-nigh limitless possibilities of reason and emotion, ambition and accomplishment, into the face of the mother. She has brought into existence a person—the clearest expression that we have of the mind and will of God. Here is a permanent contribution to the conscious forces of the universe. Here is something more than a mere energy, which will be driven along a pathway preordained by unchangeable law. Here is a force which shall choose its own ways and impress the universe in which it moves by the quality of its own thought and aspiration. In this little bundle of possibilities, which we call a babe, lie latent, inevitable and irresistible forces which shall help to make maps and point the pathway of history.

The Conservation of Life.

This life force then is our most precious possession and our most sacred trust. Instead of the shamed veil which we have drawn across this sacred office we should here focus our best thought and most reverent reason. For here at the fountain of life is the most potent place to influence life. To make a better world it is absolutely necessary to make a better motherhood.

We must face the fact that upon the ability of womanhood to bear and rear sound children depends the whole future of the race. It is difficult even to suggest the tremendous meaning of this. Upon this is dependent the nation's destiny, its dreams of achievement in commerce, art, literature and religion. For here are the springs of the life of to-morrow—the source of its thought, the stamina of its accomplishment and the quality of its purposes.

It is from this standpoint that we must look at the changed, and ever changing, industrial conditions of our life. Ever increasing thousands of girls are leaving our homes, with their traditional care and protection,

and entering the life of the store, the office and the factory. Here conditions are totally changed. Are these conditions and surroundings favorable to the preparation of womanhood to be the mothers of a new generation? Once we look at the girlhood of our land from this standpoint, all of those so-called economic questions of wage and hours, working conditions and recreation, become the most vital problems which can face a patriotic people.

A Challenge to Chivalry.

While the sons of our land are today making their reverent and affectionate gestures, in flowers or love messages, to the memories of their mothers, I am praying that their sympathies may be broadened until they shall include all the womanhood of America. Would that every son of them could come to understand that every man who, by story or innuendo, word or act, countenances sensuality, is adding the weight of his influence to drag down the standard of the motherhood of his nation. Here indeed is an opportunity for chivalry which should challenge the noblest possibilities of manhood. Let him look at the unprotected girls of his city. They are attacked by a thousand subtle influences, each one seeking to soil her life. Let the sons who love the memories of their mothers league themselves for the protection of the unguarded motherhood of the future.

Income Tax Auditors Still Needed.

Washington, May 23.—The United States Civil Service Commission states that although a number of examinations have been held, there is still need for eligibles to fill positions of auditor and inspector under the income tax unit of the bureau of internal revenue, for duty in Washington, D. C., and in the field.

Another examination for these positions will be held on June 11th throughout the United States. Entrance salaries range from \$1,800 to \$3,000 a year.

Besides qualifying in accounting experience and practical tests, applicants must pass an oral examination to determine their personal fitness for the work.

Full information and application blanks may be obtained by communicating with the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or with the secretary of the Civil Service Board at the postoffice at Seneca, S. C., or customs house in any city.
