When we come to the annual celeration of Mothers' Day the preacher wan's a sure enough text. Where could one be found of rarer beauty or more real significance than this picture given by one of the biographers of Jesus:

"There was standing by the cross of Jesus, His mother. When Jesus therefore saw His mother and the disciple standing by, whom He loved, He saith unto His mother, 'Woman, behold thy Son.' Then saith He to the disciple, 'Behold thy mother'."

Here is humanity at its best. mether who could bear a son to die for others would of course be found near the cross in this hour of His deepest need. That she could rear such a Son might be explained on the ground of His unique origin. But that she would be willing to give up such a Son for the service of humanity is the supreme triumph of motherhood.
