"SURE CURES" FOR WEEVILS.

Why Georgia manufacturers of all sorts of punk "sure death to boll weevils" tell the farmers to use the preparations they put up TO SELL, and "make more cotton than you ever made before."

Here are some of the reports, by counties, issued last week, on the crop conditions on the other side of the river:

"Jasper County—Indicated yield, 200 bales.

"Madison County—Weather conditions cloudy and rainy, favoring boll weevils.

"Newton County—Twice as many weevils, compared with last year.

"Putnam County—Weevils in every field. Estimate 100 bales for county against 18,000 before weevils came.

"Lincoln County—Crop very late. Too much rain.

"Ben Hill County—Worst shedding I ever saw. Still raining.

"Wilkes County—This county will not make 1,000 bales, against 8,000 last year and 28,000 in 1920."

SO!

It would seem that the Georgia commercial "sure cures for weevils" must be made more for "a killing" among South Carolina suckers than to kill weevils in the Empire State of the South.

At any rate, don't grab the whole bait when it is again thrown out. It will likely be tried in the early spring again. Let the Georgia weevil conditions improve before you sink any money in these "boll weevil sure cures."

"Hauling hay—to feed mules—to raise cotton—to feed boll weevils." There's a whole basket plente of food for thought in those words, which are used by County Agent G. R. Briggs in his communication this week. Pitch into this dinner basket, Mr. Oconee Farmer, help yourself liberally, but don't gorge. Eat slow-

ly—it's mighty rich food—and chew thoroughly, and you will get the very kind of nourishment from it that you need. Mr. Briggs has been writing lots of good stuff for a long time, but he got right down to the essence of things in a few words this week and gave just what is needed, if properly studied and thought over, to serve as a winter's supply of food for thought. Cut out those two lines and study them after the boll weevil has gathered your 1922 crop. And then be ready to change things at the opening of next spring.
