Just 25 years ago, on Aug. 21st, the Olds Motor Works was born.

And that little company, the brain child of Ranson E. Olds and Frank Clark, of Lansing, Mich., then comparatively insignificant, was the nucleus from which sprang one of the greatest industries in the country, and made Michigan the automobile center of the world.

Back in 1895 both Olds and Clark, young men in the employ of their fathers, had a vision of the automobile, and against the wishes of their fathers, they spent a major part of their time in a shed in Lansing perfeeting their work.

Olds, whose father made gas engines, was to furnish the engine and mechanical work, and Clark, whose father was a bullder of buggies, was to furnish the carriage and body work. After two years spent in experiments the young men incorporated the Olds Motor Vehicle Company at Lansing in 1897, with Ranson E. Olds as president, and both young men holding the principal

In 1898 they finished their first automobile, and to-day it is housed in the Smithson an Institute in Washington. Shortly after this Clark became depressed at the slowness of success of the first current sold his stock to Olds, who were to Detroit for more capital, continuing operations in his old plant in Lausing, however. On May 8th, 1899, the name of the firm was changed to the Olds Motor Works, and a recapitalization effected.

In what was destined to be the world's greatest motor offy, Olds established a second factory and starttd a business which ntade the Michigan city the center of the vast development in the auto world. He was backed in this venture by S.I.. Smith, a Michigan copper king.

Immediately the Olds company plunged into a production program which even to-day stands as a great production figure, and in 1900 the company produced 1,400 cars. In 1901 they marketed 2,500 cars, and these were sold to celebrities all over the world. 

Back to Jail, Says Harvey.

Columbia, Sept. 14-Special: Governor Harvey to-day wrote the sheriff of Union County to repossess himself of Henry Smith, white, for the purpose of serving out his sentence of eight months given him in Union during the spring of this year on conviction of violation of the prohibition

Almost immediately after his conviction Smith received a parole from Governor Cooper, which expired on Aug. 1, 1922. When Governor Harvey succeeded to the Governorship, he wrote a letter extending the time when Smith should report to serve out the remainder of his sentence until his case could be investigated.
