COTTON GINNINGS IN EXCESS

Of Last Year by Million and a Half Bales to First of November.

Washington, Nov. 8.—Cotton ginned prior to Nov. 1 amounted to 8,139,839 running bales, counting 143,086 round bales as half bales and including 13,335 bales of American Egyptian and 3,077 bales of sea island, so the census bureau has announced.

To Nov. 1 last year ginnings were 6,646,354 running bales, counting 110,981 round bales as half bales and including 11,812 bales of American Egyptian and 1,816 bales of sea island.
