THE SOUTHERN LIFE. - We see from the Memphis Avalanche of February 3d, that the Southern Life Insurance Company have gone into voluntary bankruptey, because it is unable to pay the liabilities pressed upon it chiefly arising from claims against the Carolina Life Insurance Company, and for which that Company is sought to be held liable, and on some of which the courts have held that Company to be liable. The assets of the Company are \$1,578,298.54; and its liabilities \$1,517,000.00. From this showing the assets are \$61,298.50 above its liabilities; it this be so, policy holders will not suffer.
