## Township Meetings.

Next Saturday is the day designated by Col. Bowen for meetings in each Township, to organize Democratic clubs. We know, on account of the importance of doing all the work possible in the farms, that this is not a favorable time for the meetings; but on account of the great importance of this movement, we trust the honest, sturdy yeomanry of the County will lay aside for the once their farm duties and repair promptly to the places of meeting.

## Rally! Rally!

A meeting will be held at the Court House on Saturday next, the 4th inst. for the purpose of organizing a Democratic club, and electing three Delegates to the County Convention, which meets on Saturday in April for the purpose electing Delegates to the State Convention. All who are in favor of overthrowing the corruption and oppression of Radical rule, and the restoration of an honest and economical government, are invited to come forward and join the organization.

We acknowledge the receipt of an invitation to attend the anniversary celebration of the Excelsior Literary Society of Newberry College, at Walhalla, on Friday evening, 31st instant, at half past 7 o'clock. The National Democratic Convention will be held in St. Louis on 27th of June next. Chicago was defeated by two votes.

South Carolina has fortunately gotten rid of two of the Mosses; if she could get rid of the other, she would be still more fortunate; these Mosses, unlike the Mosses of old, are uncertain leaders, and shockingly poor deliverers.

WELL IN HAND.—Colonel Counts, chairman of the Democratic party in Barnwell County, reports that returns from the different townships show about three fourths of the entire white vote were enrolled at the first meeting of the township clubs. This gives Barnwell a Democratic phalanx eighteen hundred strong to start with.

A resolution passed by a former Legislature of Mississippi, approving Gen. Sheridan's conduct at New Orleans, has just been expunged from the records.

There are 3,000 white men in Florida who have not voted since the downfall of the Confederacy—enough to insure a Democratic triumph at every election.

The statistics of the Free Methodist Church are nine conferences, 255 preachers, 10,000 members, 225 Sunday schools, 8,000 scholars, and church property to the amount of \$500,000. The church was formed in 1860.

Charlotte Cushman, the celebrated American actress, died in the city of Boston on the 20th ult.

Harvard college received subscriptions and gifts amounting to \$214,000 during the year 1875.

## Democratic Clubs.

For the convenience of our friends in the different Townships in the County, who are called upon to meet on Saturday next, for the purpose of organizing clubs, we submit the following form of Constitution and By-Laws for their consideration:

## CONSTITUTION.

I. The name of this club shall be Democratic club.

II. The officers of this club shall consist of a President, a first, second and third Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and an Executive Committee, consisting of five members.

III. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings, and to call special meetings when requested so to do by a majority of the Executive Committee; provided that in case of the absence of the President at any meeting, it shall be the duty of one of the vice-presidents, according to numerical order, to preside and perform all the duties of the President.

IV. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a correct record of the proceedings of each meeting, and to conduct all the correspondence of the club.

V. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds, paid in for the use of the club, and pay out the same under the direction of the President and by order of a majority of the members.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to exercise a general supervision over the affairs of the club, and to suggest such measures as they may deem conducive to the interest of the club, and to use their personal influence to increase the membership.

VII. It shall be the duty of each member to use his best efforts to promote the objects of this association, which is to secure an honest, faithful and capable administration of State and County affairs, and with this end in view, to use all legitimate means to increase the membership.

VIII. All officers of this club shall hold their offices for a term of twelve months, and shall be elected by ballot, a majority vote of all the members of the club being necessary to determine such election.

## BY-LAWS.

I. The regular meeting of the club shall be at ——— on the ——— day of each month, at ——— o'clock (a. m. or p. m.)

II. A quorum to transact business shall consist of a majority of all the members of the club.

III. A vote of two-thirds of all the members of the club shall be necessary to alter or amend the constitution.

IV. The rules for the government of the club shall be such as are now used, and recognized in the government of legislative bodies.

COLUMBIA, S. C., February 23.—At a meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee, held in Columbia on February 22, 1876, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That it is recommended to the Democracy of the State of South Carolina to meet, by townships or precincts, and elect delegates to County Conventions to be held in April next; that these County Conventions shall elect delegates, in number equal to twice the representation of the county in the present House of Representatives of the State, to a State Democratic Convention, to be held in Columbia on Thursday, May 4, for the purpose of appointing delegates to the National Democratic Convention, to be held in St. Louis on the 27th June next, and to take such further action as the convention shall deem proper and necessary.

The several County Chairmen will take steps in their respective counties to carry into effect the foregoing resolution.

The township and precinct meetings can be held when it is most convenient. The County Conventions for the election of delegates will be held in April only.

The County Chairman of Richland, with the resident members of this committee will make all necessary arrangements for the accommodation of the State Convention.

## Communications.

Mr. Editor: Will you give a small space in your columns to inform the people of your County what the Baptists of South Carolina, following the example of some of the other States, desire to accomplish during this year. While the United States as a Government, is now preparing to celebrate the Centennial year of their civil liberty, we as Baptists, have resolved to make a grand and glorious effort to celebrate the centennial of our religious liberty. The Baptists of this State, in convention assembled, have resolved to establish a blazing memorial of the sufferings of the early Baptists in their effort to establish a government with laws to protect and guarantee to every christian the right to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience. For this purpose, they propose to raise a centennial fund of not less than fifty thousand dollars from the State, which is to be equally divided between the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and Furman University. These institutions, they propose, shall stand as lasting monuments of this effort, and as instruments for the propagation of the truths of christianity; and, as one means of effecting this object, "family certificates" will be issued, engraved with portraits of eight Presidents of the State Convention of the Baptists of South Carolina; among whom are Judge J. B. O'Neill, Dr. Richard Furman and others. On the certificates will be written the names of the father and mother of the family contributing, and each of the children, and opposite to each name the amount contributed—not to be less than one dollar, this certificate may be framed and preserved in the family. The State Convention appointed a Centennial Committee for the State, and this committee has appointed a sub-committee for each Association. For the Twelve Mile Association, the committee consists of Rev. W. B. Singleton, as chairman, and Revs. J. C. Hudson and G. W. Singleton, and brothers O. H. C. Smith, G. W. Taylor and E. H. Barton. The Baptist of this State, through these committees appeal to all Baptist Pastors and Deacons, and all zealous brothers and sisters to aid, the committees in vigorously pushing this enterprise, trusting that its results will furnish a strong and worthy expression of gratitude for the religious liberty we now enjoy. The committee for the Twelve Mile Association earnestly ask and expect to receive the hearty co-operation of the pastors and members of each church in this Association, in disseminating proper information to the churches. The committee expect to be able to send out publications to the churches, showing how much the Baptists, as such have done in early times to secure to us the blessings of religious or soul liberty.

COLUMBIA, Feb. 26.—J. D. Robertson was expelled from the House today. He was a member of the committee to select text books for the schools in the State, and had made corrupt proposals to several publishing houses in New York, Boston and other places. The committee appointed to investigate the matter recommended he be expelled from the House. After a patient hearing the report of the committee was adopted.

PESTH, Feb. 28.—The waters of the Danube, are subsiding, there is a great distress among the people, over five thousand men, women and children whose homes were flooded, are lodged in churches, and hundreds of persons passed Saturday night on the roofs of their dwellings, and were rescued in a starving condition.
