The attendance of the people on the Court is quite large.

Thunder and lightning, accompanied by a heavy rain, fell on Tuesday evening.

The United States soldiers, stationed at Greenville, captured and brought before the U. S. Commissioner, J. L. Thornley, Esq., last Saturday, six men for illicit distilling. All were lodged in jail. We have repeatedly warned our people against making this "moonshine whiskey," but, it seems, nothing but their own sad experience will suffice.

On Sunday night last, Rev. Hugh McLees preached a highly interesting sermon on the truth of prophecy. His arguments, in support of his subject, were well chosen and forcibly expressed. We shall not attempt, however, to give even an analysis of his discourse, for we should fail to do it justice. We are glad to learn that this is the first of a series of sermons on the same subject. Cannot arrangements be effected whereby Mr. McLees can be enabled to preach for us at 11 o'clock, A. M., instead of his present nightly appointments? This, it seems, would suit everybody better.

Rev. Thos. Looper, a Baptist minister of this county, has married two hundred and seventy-six couple in twenty three years.

Rev. Mr. Jaeger, the converted Jewish Rabbi, and Prof. in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Greenville, will preach in the Baptist church at Easley, next Sunday morning, the 12th inst. at 11 o'clock.

We call attention to the Southern Home School, located at Anderson, S. C., for young ladies. It is under the management of Mrs. J. V. Moore, Miss S. Y. Robinson, in the literary, and Miss L. Butler in the musical departments. Tuition is reasonable and free to boarding students for the first session.

Coroner Boyd held an inquest over the dead body of a negro boy found dead in Town Creek, on Sunday last. The boy had been subject to fits, and having been sent on an errand to a neighboring house, is supposed to have taken fit while crossing the foot-log.

Mrs. McDevitt, wife of the County Treasurer of Edgefield, was injured by a run-off of the C. C. and A. R. R. in January, 1875. She brought suit, through Maj. W. T. Gary, for damages. The Railroad settled the case on last Thursday, by paying Mrs. McDevitt \$6,000 in cash.—Edgefield Advertiser.

A son of Mr. James Lick, the California philanthropist, has recovered a judgment against his father for \$3,285 for services.

Bishop Quintard, of Tennessee, who is now in England collecting funds for the University of the South, has been eminently successful.

Constitution of the Pickens Democratic Club.

In pursuance of a call for that purpose, the citizens of Pickens Township assembled in the Court House, on Saturday, 4th inst., and organized the Pickens Democratic Club. On motion Hon. D. F. Bradley was called to the Chair, and B. B. Earle requested to act as Secretary.

The following Constitution was then submitted by the Committee, appointed by the Chairman to draft a constitution, and was adopted unanimously:

ARTICLE I. The name of this organization shall be "The Pickens Democratic Club."

II. The officers of the club shall consist of a President, first and second vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and an Executive Committee, consisting of five members.

III. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings, and to call special meetings when requested to do so by a majority of the Executive Committee; provided, that in case of the absence of the President at any meeting, it shall be the duty of one of the vice-Presidents, according to numerical order, to preside and perform all the duties of the President.

IV. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a correct record of the proceedings of each meeting, and to conduct all the correspondence of the club.

V. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds, paid in for the use of the club, and pay out the same under the direction of the President, and by order of a majority of the members.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee, to exercise general supervision over the affairs of the club, and to suggest such matters as they deem conducive to the interest of the club, and to use their personal influence to increase the membership.

VII. It shall be the duty of each member to use his best efforts to promote the objects of this association, which is to secure an honest, faithful and capable administration of State and County affairs, and with this end in view, to use all legitimate means to increase the membership.

VIII. All officers of this club shall hold their office for the term of twelve months, and shall be elected by ballot, a majority of the votes of all the members of the club being necessary to determine such election.

IX. The regular meetings of this club shall be held on the 3d Saturday, at Pickens Court House in each month, at 3 o'clock, P. M.

X. Any male citizens of the vicinity may become a member of the club, by signing the Constitution, and thereby pledging himself to support and sustain to the best of his ability all nominations made by the Democratic party, either in National, State or County elections.

XI. The members of this club pledge themselves to each other, and to the Democratic party, to abide by and sustain the nominees of the party for all offices, either National, State or County, and will discountenance every effort on the part of individuals to distract our counsels and divide the vote upon independent candidates, whom we will regard hereafter as giving aid and comfort to our political opponents.

XII. Any article of this constitution may be altered or amended, upon one weeks notice, by a vote of two thirds of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

I. The regular meeting of the club shall be on 3d Saturday in each month.

II. A quorum to transact business shall consist of one-third of all the members of the club.

III. The rules for the government of the club shall be such as are now used and recognized in the government of legislative bodies.

After an enrollment of the names of those who wished to become members, an election for permanent officers of the Club, according to the above Constitution, took place and resulted as follows:

President, Hon. D. F. Bradley; first Vice-President, J. H. Carlisle; second Vice-President, O. P. Field; Secretary, W. T. McFall; Treasurer, B. B. Earle; Executive Committee, Reese Bowen, Geo. W. Dorr, W. M. Ferguson, Wm. M. Orr, and J. M. Stewart.

On motion of R. A. Child, the Chair appointed R. A. Child, E. F. Looper and Riley Simmons to the County Convention, which meets at the Court House, on Saturday in April.

It was resolved that these proceedings be published in THE PICKENS SENTINEL.

The club then adjourned to the next regular day of meeting.

Easley Democratic Club.

EASLEY STATION, Pickens Co., S. C., March 4.

Pursuant to a call by Col. R. E. Bowen, County Chairman, a goodly number of the Democratic voters of Pickensville Township, assembled at this place to-day, for the purpose of perfecting a Township Club, and appointing Delegates to a County Convention of the Party, to be held at Pickens, on Saturday in April next.

Thos. W. Russell was called to preside over the deliberations of the meeting, and John R. Gossett, requested to act as Secretary.

Col. Bowen, State Senator, by request, made a few well-timed and pertinent remarks, explaining the objects of the meeting, and expressing himself as well pleased with the political outlook, and hopeful of a complete victory of the honest people in the next general election, and the overthrow of the corrupt party that has well nigh ruined the State, and urged the Democratic Party of Pickens County to renewed efforts, to accomplish so desirable an end, and further expressed himself as opposed to anything like a mongrel fusion ticket, but counseled straight out nominations—this last sentiment, evidently being most heartily endorsed by the entire assemblage.

After the remarks of Col. Bowen, a call was made to all willing to create a Democratic club, to give their names to the Secretary to be enrolled, whereupon some seventy five presented their names for enrollment.

The adoption of a Constitution being next in order, a member presented the following, which, after being discussed by a few gentlemen, was unanimously adopted, first seriatim, and then as a whole. (The Constitution and By-Laws adopted are similar to other clubs, which we have not room to print.)

The officers elected, per the constitution, are: T. W. Russell, President; J. S. Latham, Capt. J. H. Bowen and J. W. Brunson, vice-Presidents; F. A. McMahan, Secretary; D. Grice, Treasurer; E. H. Bates, T. J. Bowen, B. J. Williams, T. M. Wilborn and Elias Day, Executive Committee.

The following gentlemen were elected delegates to attend the County Convention to assemble at Pickens Court House, on Saturday in April:

John R. Gossett, E. H. Bates and J. S. Latham.

Easley Station, the 1st Saturday in each month, at 2 o'clock, was the time and place appointed for the meeting of this club.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to have the proceedings of this meeting published in the PICKENS SENTINEL and Greenville News. No further business being introduced, the meeting adjourned.

Goodrich, the famous Chicago divorce lawyer, has been disbarred by the Supreme Court in scathing judgment delivered by Justice Breese.

An old farmer said to his sons, 'Boys, don't you ever spekerlate, or wait for somethin' to turn up. You might jest as well go and sit down on a stone in the middle of a meddor with a pail twixt your legs, and wait for a cow to back up to you to be milked.'

Gen. Tombs is lecturing in Georgia on the Magna Charta.

Opened at Pickens on Monday, at 10 o'clock a. m. His Honor Judge Cooke, presiding. After the Grand Jury was called and sworn, his Honor proceeded to charge them substantially as follows:

One year has elapsed since any court has been held in your County, and yet from the bills laid before me by the Solicitor, the amount of crime in your County is very small, considering the length of time and population of the County. This is highly creditable to your people, and must be gratifying to you, as it is to the court. He hoped this state of things would continue, and he was sure nothing would contribute more to this end than the faithful discharge of the duties of the Grand Jury. You are the grand inquest of the County, and your duties extend to the oversight of all your public officers, and to the protection of the people from wrong and oppression from every quarter. You are to know no man, but only your duty, and to discharge it fearlessly without malice to any one, and without fear, favor, affection, reward or hope of reward. By the present law, which I consider a wise provision, your term of service is for twelve months. During that time you are to be faithful sentinels of the public interest and public welfare. You can learn and improve upon your duties from time to time, and thus in the future be better able to discharge them properly. While you keep a watchful eye on your officials, they will better discharge their full duty, and this will tend to prevent crime. His Honor then read the Foreman's oath, clause by clause, and explained it fully to the jury.

Among your duties you are required to visit all the public offices, and make such examinations into their management as will secure to the people the performance of the duties imposed on them by law. This is essential to the security of the people and the proper administration of the law. The office of the Sheriff should be examined carefully. Often from ignorance or fear, Sheriffs fail to discharge their duties in several particulars, and especially in matters arising under the lien law. He did not know that such was the case here, but the jury should examine into the matter. You should see whether in executing this law the Sheriff has levied on property mortgaged by way of lien for advances for agricultural purposes. The law does not allow a lien in such cases on horses, cattle and other property, though such liens are commonly taken. The law is a special one for a special purpose, and the lien is limited to the crop grown, or to be grown on the land, for the making of which the advances were made. Besides, the Clerk is the only person who can issue a warrant to enforce a lien, which the Sheriff or his proper deputy is the only person who can execute the warrant. You should, in this connection, see whether any of your Trial Justices has attempted to enforce the lien law by process from their courts.

They were instructed to visit the jail and see that the prisoners were properly fed and slept, and well treated. You, or a committee from your body should also visit the Poor House and see that the County Commissioners are properly managing that institution, and carrying out the humane ends for which it was established.—The offices of the Clerk and Judge of Probate should be examined, and you should see that their books are properly kept. You should also inquire whether the Clerk has properly deposited monies coming into his hands in his official capacity. In performing this duty, you can have the assistance of an attorney. You should examine the office of the County Auditor and see how he is discharging his duty. Every taxpayer has a right to return his property under oath at his valuation of it, and not at the price the County Auditor may think right. The office of School Commissioner is one of great importance to every citizen. He is charged with educating the rising generation, and, chiefly among his duties in this connection, he is required by law to visit the schools several times during the year, and to lecture the teachers with a view to improve the system of education. The Jury Commissioners should be required to discharge their duties properly, and you should see to this. He finds they have not done it at this term of court. A regular practising physician has been put upon the jury

at this court, which is contrary to law. No name should be put in the jury box, unless one of the Commissioners know he has the qualifications prescribed by law, and is liable to serve.

His Honor further stated that no man should be a Trial Justice, who takes and holds the office for the purpose of making money out of it. The law has now made it the duty of the Judge to examine and pass upon these accounts, and in doing this it is rare that he does not find it necessary to scale them largely. You should examine whether any of your Trial Justices have willfully violated the honest law in ordering the crops of citizens levied and sold for debt. Examine specially, whether the Trial Justices at Easley has not done this for a store account. The crop of the citizen is exempt, except for advances under the lien law, and if you find he has done this, you will present him for indictment.

The duties of County Commissioners are so extensive, that you could not remember them if I should specially direct your attention to them. You should, however, examine their office carefully, and see that they are performing their duties according to law.

The law now requires special levies for roads, courts, &c., and this should be enforced. His Honor in concluding his charge, stated that nearly all the high crimes, and all the homicides in the County for three years, are attributable to the inordinate use of liquor. You should try to bring to light all parties who are peddling liquors or selling without license.—There is no law for peddling liquor and this business should be stopped.

His Honor then briefly instructed them as to the several indictments, which the Solicitor had prepared.—The bills handed out to this time, consist of two cases of burglary, one of rape, one of bigamy, obstructing railroad and violating contract.
