EASLEY'S FIRST SALE.—Mr. W. W. Ford sold the first bale of new cotton at Easley on the 17th inst. C. P. Ranton was the purchaser, at 11 1/2 cents per pound. This is up with Greenville and Abbeville.

Quite an interesting protracted meeting was held at Mt. Carmel Baptist church week before last. There were five additions to the membership of the church, and the church was greatly revived. Rev. S. A. Gary is the pastor.

DEDICATION.—The new Presbyterian church, located about two miles East of Easley station, on the public road leading by Cox's bridge, to Greenville, will be dedicated on the first Sabbath in next month. Rev. Mr. Hall, of Greenville will conduct the dedicatory services.

These with those now established, will make nine public bridges over Saluda river in this County. In the opinion of some of our citizens, these are entirely too many to require the public to keep up, when four, they say, would answer all the demands of the public.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, Columbia, August 12th, 1881.

Whereas, information has been received at this Department, that an atrocious murder was committed in Pickens County on the 20th day of July, A. D., 1881, upon the body of Thomas L. Brayton, by some person unknown. Now therefore, I, Johnson Hagood, Governor of the State of South Carolina, in order that justice may be done and the majesty of the law vindicated, do hereby offer a reward of TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS for the apprehension and delivery in any jail of this State, of the said person engaged in this outrage, with proof to convict. In testimony whereof, I hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State to be affixed, at Columbia, this 12th day of August, A. 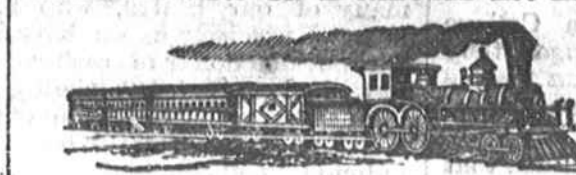
