#### Representation Doubled.

The State Democratic Convention meets in Columbia on the first day of August next, for the purpose of nominating a State ticket. By recent action of the State Executive Committee, the number of delegates from each county will be twice the number of members in the General Assembly and consequently, Pickens will be entitled to six instead of three delegates as heretofore.

We publish this week the redistricting Act, and will publish in our next issue, the Act to amend the Election law and the two joint resolutions proposing Constitutional amendments to be voted on by the people at the next election. The provisions of an Act requiring all physicians to register by the 1st of last June was extended to the 1st of next January.

A me tirg of the patrons and others in forested in the school at this place was held in the Court House on last Saturday evening for the purpose of raising money to build a school house. Hon. W. T. An Act to regulate the licensing of physicians and surgeons.
