War in the East.

On July 10th inst, the English fleet, lying n the harbor at Alexandria, Egypt, bombarded and demolished the forts erected for the protection of that place. The cause of ne war is concisely set forth in the follow it g extract from the News and Courier: "The objective point of England, at pres-

ent, merely is to obtain a staple government in Egypt. Arabi Pasha is the leader of the National party in Egypt and seeks, and demands, home rule for his people Egypt for the Egyptians and war upon the foreigner, is the present cry of Arabi and his followers, the English being their pet aversions. The Sullan, who has but a nominal severeignty over Egypt, was requested by the Powers to bring Arabi into subjection, but he encouraged the National leader while he prefessed a desire to comply with the wishes of England and France. Dervisch Pasha, whom the Sultan sent to Alexandria, was unable to cope with Arabi, and bors wheat, how it might be damthe Khedive remained, as before his arrival completely at the mercy of the National party. The Ambassadors of the European Powers met in conference at Constantinople, with the intention of requiring Turkey to restore order in Egypt. In the meanwhile Arabi Pasha threatened to blow up the Suez Canal if a gun should be fired ag ainst him, and went to work vigorously to strengthen the forts commanding the harbor. Failing to comply with the demands of Admiral Seymour that the work should be stopped, Arabi was notified that the new forts must be surrendered to the English forces. The Election Law. The full text of the Act amending.

the Election law is as follows: of the General Statutes, entitled

"Of Elections," Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representaives of the State of South Catolina, low met and sitting in General As embly, and by the authority of the ame, That Section 91, Title II. Part I, of the General Statutes, entitled "Of Elections," be, and the same is hereby, amended, so that the officers named therein, by a clerical caror, as assistant supervisors of elections, shall be known as assistant supervisors of registration and the persons heretofore appointed as such supervisors shall be the assistant supervisors of registration, and any act or acts heretofore done by them under the said section, as such supervisors, shall be, and the same are hereby, declared valid and effectual, as if the said persons had been named and appointed as ass sistant supervisors of registration; and that the cierical error in said section requiring them to sit with the supervisors of election be corrected by substituting the word "registration" for the word "election."

Sec. 2. That any person interfering with or obstructing any supervisor of registration or his assistant in the discharge of his duty shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars nor more than one thousand dollars, and be imprisoned not less than six months nor more than two

Sec. 3. That Section 121 be, and the same is nereby, amended by adding thereto as follows: "All county boards of canvassers, whether for State or Federal elections, shall have the power, and it is made their dus ty, as judicial officers, to decide all cases under protest or contest that may arise, subject to appeal to the Board of State Canvassers, who shall also sit and act in all such matters as judicial officers.

Sec. 4. That Section 133 be amended in line 2 by striking out the word "ten" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "fifteen" so that the section as amended shall read. the board shall have power to ad journ from day to day for a term not exceeding filteen days.

Sec. 5. That section 98 be amended by adding thereto the following: "Whenever a new polling precine is established by law, it shall be the duty of the supervisor of registration to transfer from the books of registration the names of such qual ified voters registered at other precincts as should, under this Act, register and vote at the new precincts so established, and who may request such transfer, and to make such changes as may be necessary in the certificates of registration issued to such voters, and such voters shall thereafter vote only at such precincts to which they have been thus trans-

S. c. 6. It shall not be lawful for the managers to count any ballot upon which there shall appear the name of any office or the name of any person in connection with any office other than the office for which the box in which such ballot is found is provided.

Sec. 7. That the netion of the Governor in appointing a supervisor of registration for the County of Berkeley be confirmed, and the said supervisor be paid the same compensation as the supervisors of counties other than Charleston.

Sec. 8. This Act shall go into et eet from and immediately after the date of its approval. Approved July 5. A. D. 1882.

Formation of New Counties. The Joint Resolution proposing a Constitutional amendment to Section 3, Article II, of the Constitution of the State relating to the forming of new counties, provides that at the next general election the tollowing amendment to the Contitution shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State, to wit: Strike out in Section 3, Article II. of the Constitution the words "but no new county shall be hereafter formed of less extent than six hundred and twenty-five square miles, nor shall any existing counties be reduced to a less extent than six bundred and twenty five square miles," and insert in lieu thereof the tollowin : "Provided, That no new county shall be formed which has a population of less than one one-hundred and twenth-fourth part of the whole number of inhabitants of the State, and an area less than four hundred square miles, nor shall any existing counties be reduced to a less area than four hundred square miles"

Time for Holding Elections.

The Joint Resolution proposing a Constitutional amendment relating to the time of holding elections provides that the following amendment to S ction II, Article II, of the Cons itution be submitted to the qualihed electors of the State at the next general election, to wit:

That Section 11, of Article II, of the Constitution of this State, as amended, be, and is hereby, stricken out, and the following inserted in lieu thereof: "The general election for Senators and Representatives shall be held in every second year, in such manner, at such time, and at such places as the Legislature may provide,"
