The Pickens High School opened last Monday with 78 scholars.
We have heard some farmers say that the present crop is the best they ever had.
The Town Council are having the streets put in good order. This is right.
Rev. G. W. Singleton sang and lectured on music to a tolerably large audience in the Methodist church at this place on last Sunday night.
Misses May Harrison, Corrie Keith and Sallie Payne, three of Greenville's charming young ladies, are visiting relatives and friends at Easley.
We have seen a potatoe grown by our Mr. J. C. Thompson this year which measured about six inches around and was near the same length.
Hezekiah Hughes, who has been carrying the mail between this place and Easley Station for Mr. Ritchey for the last year or so, died at Easley Station last week. He had been in bad health for several years.
The youngest bride ever heard of in this country was a Miss Cato, of Lancaster, aged 11 years, who was last week married to a Mr. Paine, aged 21.
The total number of voters registered in Spartanburg county is 5,256; whites 3,929; colored 1,327—white majority 2,609.
The Pickens Institute Joint Stock Company has purchased what is known as the Clayton lot in this place, containing four acres, upon which they propose to erect their building. It is a very pretty place, and with a nice substantial building on it will be quite attractive.
William Kirksey, aged 77 years, died at his residence near Table Mountain last week. Mr. K was retired in this County and was well and favorably known to many of our citizens.
Rev. S. P. H. Elwell closed a protracted meeting at this place on last Saturday. The meeting was quite interesting, and the names of several persons were added to the church during the progress of the meeting.
We were pleased to meet Dr. Edwards, of Due West, in our town the other day. The Dr. thinks of locating somewhere in this section, and we hope he may conclude to fix upon Pickens as the place. We feel sure he could not do better.
Mr. McCravy, a talented young lawyer of Spartanburg, spent a few days in Pickens last week. He seemed to be very much pleased with Pickens, and we feel confident he will pay us another visit before a great while. Pickens has many attractions.
Mr. Joseph Philpot, aged 80 years, died at his residence near Central Station, in this County, on the 18th inst. He was, we believe a native of Edgefield County, and moved to this County over twenty years ago. He was a member of the Methodist Church and a good citizen.
Mr. S. M. Cox, one of the practical and progressive farmers of the Saluda side of our County, favored us last Saturday with some very nice sweet potatoes, the largest we have seen this season. He also left our office a very fine bunch of about 70 stalks, which all evidently sprang from one grain.
Mr. B. O. Ambler has left some very fine Irish potatoes, one of which measured ten inches around. Mr. A says these left with us were a sample of his smallest potatoes. They have grown so thick and large that they have pushed off the garden plings.
A very heavy rain fell at this place on last Friday evening. It extended pretty generally all over the County. A moderate rain followed on Saturday for over half the day and the ground was thoroughly wet. The farmers say this rain will make their early corn, but with continued good seasons such a corn crop will be made has never before been seen in this County. Just us be thankful.

Elsewhere in this issue we publish the proceedings of the County Executive Committee, which met on last Saturday. It will be seen that the first day of September has been fixed as the time for holding the primary election, and certain days designated for holding public meetings with the several clubs in the County. The Democratic candidates in the County are all expected to attend these meetings and address the people. The rules for governing the primary election are also published in this issue. The committee has made all the necessary arrangements for the Primary campaign, and now the candidates can get in their work.
Mr. G. W. Taylor, of Pickens, has purchased the interest of Mr. S. S. Gibbs in the furniture factory and will be hereafter associated with his brother, Mr. J. H. Taylor, who will probably devote his entire attention to conducting the enterprise in future. The new firm will be known by the name and style of Taylor Bros.
