A RIot Caused at Fairmount by a Negro Republican Desperado.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 9. A Marion, Ind, special to the Sentinel says: The Quaker town of Fairmount, twelve miles last night in the killing of Con Paul by a negro named Tom Uttley. For a time the affair took on the proportions of a riot, and when the smoke of battle cleared away six men had been shot.
