Italians Return From There With Star tling Tales of Woo. NEW YORK, March 1.—Della Pollina

ti and his wife Teresa arrived in this city yesterday from South Carolina without money, but with a big story of trials and tribulations. This is the story they tell: They arrived here from Italy, expecting to get rich very fast, on November 24 of last year. They were met at the Barge Office by Domenico Cappeilo, the agent for a man called Tomasso Scantone, who, he said, would pay them all

big wages if they would go south and do some very easy work. As this hap-pened to be just what they were looking for they decided to go South, especially as they were assured that their traveling expenses would be paid. They had no idea of where they were going, but they were transported as far as Charleston the resolution was read, and Mills arose twelve miles distant. There the men were put to work in some pumice stone quarries, where the work was very hard and where they had to stand up to their They could make only forty cents a day, and despite the promise made to

them they were "docked" for the amount of their railroad fares. They were charged exorbitant prices for food and for the privilege of sleeping in wretched hovels. They say they were often beat-en and, in fact, treated just as if they were prisoners. At the end of three months of hard work and poor living They managed to escape from the armed guards, who they say were stationed about the camp, and made their way to Charleston, where one of them had bank. ed \$40 which he had brought from Italy. That sufficed to pay their fares to New York, where, after they had told their tale, they were taken care of by the Italian Benevolent Society, which has its headquarters at No 46 Varick street.

The Italian Consul General telegraphed to the Italian Consul at Charleston o make inquiries. On Monday an agent will be sent from here to thoroughly investigate the matter. They say there are other Italians in the quarries who remain there because they have no money and cannot find a chance to rur away.—Herald.




