WITNESSES TO THE TRANSFORMING POWER OF CHRISTIAN RELIGION.

The Dying Christian's Testimony -- The Generous Action of Madame Sontag ---

High Bridge, Kv., July 12.—A vast concourse of people assembled this morning on the historic camp ground at High Bridge, Ky., to hear Dr. Talmage preach. Because it is a matter of history that storms have often followed heavy cannonading in wartsee it has been thought desirable to attack the sky for this meteorological purpose with a regular line of battle. A convenient and excessively and plain will be selected for operations, and the would en mortars will be planted across it in drills, as it were, for a distance of about two miles. They will be loaded with dynamite, rackarock and other materials caculated to agitate the atmosphere as much as possible, while at suitable intervals of space the balloons will be arranged for ascension. Simultaneously a light of kites will be let loose in the air.

The three-score balloons will in them-

elves represent an extraordinary wientitic novelty. They are all completed now, and each one is calculated to hold about five hundred and twenty five cubic teet of gas-one-third oxygen and twofirst, and then the hydrogen. Each balloon upon being inflated ascends under control of a double wire, which serves instead of a rope to hold it by. When t reaches the desired height the button of an electric instrument on the ground s touched, a spark ignites a fuse in the balloon, and the oxygen and dydrogen suddenly combine with a terratic explosion. Experiments made within the last few days in this city show that suc! an oxyhydrogen balloon thus limited It was expected before the meeting produces a really tremendous detonation, the cloth or paper vessel itself appearing for an instant and by daylight like a ball of fire.
