THE BEAUTIFUL MURDERER.

The time is approaching very near for the execution of the sentence of death upon Mrs. Laura D. Fair, and unless the Executive pardon be interposed, California will witness for the first time within its history the execution of a woman by hanging.

To one who lived in that community during the war and anterior to it, realizing the almost unlimited immunity guaranteed to a female especially one so suppositively beautiful as Mrs. Fair, it seems incredible that a jury could be found that would convict her of murder in the first degree.

Mrs. Fair eight years ago was in person remarkable. A blonde of most exquisite complexion, the fairness of her skin never gave room for a doubt that art had aided in any way; she had fine dark eyes, with long drooping lashes, and a form of perfect proportions.

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NEGRO OUTRAGE.

The Lawrenceville Herald, of July 7, says:

It is our duty to record one of the most brutal outrages that was ever committed in this or any other County. This outrage was committed on the night of the 30th June, at the residence of Mr. Harrison Scott, who is one of our best citizens, and who resides in the Western portion of the County, near Mt. Gallagher post office.

About 1 o'clock, on the night mentioned, a band of negroes, supposed to be some ten or twelve in number, came to his premises, and first made an attack upon the store-room, in which a little boy was sleeping.

Mr. Scott estimates the damages at five hundred dollars. The proper affidavit was made before Trial Justice Clark, who issued a warrant, and has already arrested, and lodged in jail at this place, three of the guilty party—Square Jackson, Charles Clardy and George Smith.

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EDUCATIONAL.

Wofford College's Commencement—Large Attendance—Deeply Interesting Occasion—Fifteen Graduates.

Commencement at Wofford has always been an occasion of much interest, from the simple fact that it has always been an educational seat of high grade, and because there is, at Spartanburg College, an amount of appreciative intelligence, social refinement, genial hospitality, and moral and religious worth, such as is rarely found, in a community of similar size.

With its handsome endowment swept away, however, by the war, and amidst the general wreck of the country, the attendance, since the war, upon its Commencements, though not actually small, had not been large.

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AN ORDINANCE.

To Establish Scavenger Regulations for the Town of Sumter.

SECTION I. Be it ordained by the Intendant and Wardens of the Town of Sumter in Council assembled, That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sweep or place upon any sidewalk or street of the town, any trash, or other filth or rubbish, except at such times and in such manner as a hereinafter provided.

SECTION II. Be it further ordained that on and after the passage of this ordinance, all persons shall be required before 10 o'clock in the morning of each day, (Sundays excepted), to place all filth, trash, or other filth or rubbish which may be upon their premises, in a box, barrel or other vessel, before their doors or gates, on the edge of the sidewalk or gutter leading therefrom.

SECTION III. Be it further ordained that any person or persons violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$2.50 for the first offence, and not more than \$5 for each subsequent offence.

SECTION IV. The Town Marshal or Chief of Police is hereby required to enforce the provisions of this ordinance, and to report all violations thereof.

SECTION V. Ratified in Town Council this, the 19th day of June, 1871.

SECTION VI. Be it ordained by the Intendant and Wardens of the Town of Sumter in Council assembled, That all able bodied male persons between the age of 18 and 45 years, (except active members of Fire Companies) residing within the corporate limits of the Town of Sumter, shall be liable to work on the public streets, lanes and alleys within the corporate limits of said town, at such times and in such manner as hereinafter provided.

SECTION VII. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police to make out for the Clerk and Treasurer, a full and complete list of all persons residing within the corporate limits of the town of Sumter, liable to work on the streets of said town, and the Clerk and Treasurer shall under his Police commanding him to summon all persons so liable, who have not paid the commutation money as heretofore provided, to meet in front of the Court House, with such necessary tools and implements as the Chief of Police or other person, appointed by the Intendant for that purpose and appear before the Town Council, at the first regular meeting thereafter, to answer for such default.

SECTION VIII. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police to order out every such person so liable at the time and in manner as aforesaid, to do and perform the work aforesaid on the public streets, lanes and alleys of the town; and if any such person, liable as aforesaid, being personally warned by said Chief of Police, or by having a written notice served at his place of residence, and having failed to pay the commutation money shall refuse or neglect, having had three days notice, to attend in person or by a substitute equally able to perform said duty as himself, or having attended, shall refuse to obey the directions of the said Chief of Police or other person, appointed by the Intendant for that purpose as herein-before provided, he shall be liable to a fine of not less than Five Dollars nor more than Fifteen Dollars.
