And that the light schedules should be such as not permit Sumter to compete with Camden and Cheraw, argues something peculiarly wrong.

"A Merchant" and his correspondent present the difficulty fairly, we can feel that the Rail Road managers mentioned will at once proceed to remedy it.

We wish there could be a "new departure" in that tone of society which demands that wounded honor should be washed in human blood.

The tongue of slander is glib and active. An evil word spoken in haste is indiscreetly conveyed, and, in its repetition, often exaggerated. Bad blood is generated, and human blood flows, desolating the household, leaving widows and orphans the victims of passion, and wounded honor washed in blood smells no sweeter for the lurid abolition.

These thoughts come upon reading the sad tragedy enacted recently in New Orleans. Mr. Rainey having been in business with Mr. Boyd, was dissatisfied with his management, and spoke of Boyd as a thief. AN ORNINANCE

To Amend an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance under the 30th Section of the Act approved 9th of March, 1871, authorizing the Intendant and Wardens of the Town of Sumter "To make such Ordinances as they may deem expedient in relation to licensing persons who are or may be engaged in and carrying on any business within the corporate limits. Ratified the 5th June, A. D. 1871.

Be it Ordained by the Intendant and Wardens of the Town of Sumter in Council assembled, that so much of Section VII of said Ordinance as is expressed in the following words and figures, viz: "On Agencies not herein specially mentioned" carried on by other than regular merchants for each agency \$10, be amended, to read as follows, viz: On Agencies not herein specially mentioned" carried on by other than regular merchants for each Agency \$5.

SEC. III.—That so much of Section VII of said Ordinance as imposes a Special Tax upon Wholesale and Retail Dealers in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) be amended to read as follows:

On each Retail Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales do not exceed five thousand dollars, \$5 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed five thousand dollars, but do not exceed ten thousand dollars, 10 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed ten thousand dollars, but do not exceed twenty thousand dollars, 15 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed \$20,000, but do not exceed \$30,000, 20 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed \$30,000, but do not exceed \$40,000, 25 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed \$40,000, but do not exceed \$50,000, 30 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed \$50,000, but do not exceed \$60,000, 35 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed \$60,000, but do not exceed \$70,000, 40 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed \$70,000, but do not exceed \$80,000, 45 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed \$80,000, but do not exceed \$90,000, 50 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed \$90,000, but do not exceed \$100,000, 55 00 On each Dealer in Goods, Wares and Merchandise (other than Spirituous Liquors) whose annual sales exceed \$100,000, 60 00
