It must be apparent to every thinking man, that the want of the South, is an industrial want, and not a want of manufacturing interests. This is the great means through which the income of population and capital is to be stimulated and realized, and the actual wealth of the country increased and developed.

The great wealth of the North, and East consists mainly in manufactures, and the poverty of the South is the fact that we manufacture comparatively nothing. Well, every article, whether of luxury, utility, comfort or necessity, is imported, and all to be paid for out of the small and precarious earnings derived from the growth and sale of cotton in the crude form.

Let us see for a moment how it works: The farmer, through a whole year of toil, difficulty and labor, raises his cotton and brings it to market and sells it to the merchant, who sends it away, to be shipped to New York or some foreign port. Its value increases as it goes from cost of transportation, &c., and something must be made, if possible, by every party that handles it, until it reaches the manufacturer.

At the last term of the Court of Common Pleas for this county, the question of negro debts was brought directly before the court. Suit has been brought upon a note, which was given by the evidence to have been shown in part for the purchase money of a negro slave.

Some of the new manufacturers are now paying profits of from twenty to fifty per cent on the capital invested. They have started two paper mills, where 16,000 South Carolina cottons are produced, and full of experience there have not yet got far enough along to spare their capital from the cotton, rice or sugar fields.

AN ORDINANCE
To License Persons who are or may be
engaged as Agents for the Purchase of
Produce, who do not hold a License of a
State a year or longer, within the
Corporate Limits of the Town of
Sumter.

SECTION I.—That each and every person
resident of the Town of Sumter, not holding a
License a year or longer of a State in the town,
who shall carry on any faculty, profession, occu-
pation or employment, or who shall offer to pur-
chase any goods, wares or merchandise, produce
or other commodity, or commission, or as agent
for another, shall before entering upon such
occupation, trade or employment, or before offer-
ing to purchase any goods, wares or merchandise,
obtain a License from the Town Council, and pay
therefor the sum of Five Dollars for each month,
or any part thereof.

AN ORDINANCE
Under the 27th Section of the Act ap-
proved March 9th, 1871, authorizing
the Intendant and Wardens to
appoint one or more Public Weighers

SECTION I.—That one or more Public Weigh-
ers shall be appointed by the Intendant and War-
dens of the Town of Sumter, to hold office during
the pleasure of the Town Council.

SECTION VII.—That for any neglect of duty
on the part of said Public Weigher, he shall be
liable to be removed from office by the Town
Council.

SECTION VIII.—That all persons bringing
Cotton into the Town of Sumter, for sale, shall
bring with them a report to the Clerk and Treas-
urer on Monday morning of each week, of all cotton
weighed by him or them during the week pre-
ceding, and shall also bring with them, over to
the Clerk and Treasurer all fees collected by
him during said week.
