

The American Hebrews.—Cincinnati, Jan. 12.—The annual meeting of the Union American Hebrew Congregation was held yesterday. A report favoring the erection of a college and dormitories in connection with the Union was favorably received. The recommendation of the board of delegates on civil and religious rights to solicit donations from the congregations for the alliance of Israelite Universalist for Palestine and Java was declared inexpedient. The measure for leading the Hebrew brethren into agricultural pursuits is still to have assumed a tangible shape. A committee was appointed to solicit land, farming implements and money. The Union adjourned to meet at Niagara on the third Thursday of July.

THE STATE OF IRELAND GETTING "NO BETTER FAST."—London, January 12.—The correspondent of the Press Association reports that the distress in Ireland is increasing. Five hundred inhabitants of County Limerick are on the brink of starvation. They proceeded to-day in a body to Cronin and obtained four cartloads of food by the urgent representation of their extremity. The streets of Cork are patrolled by mounted police, and the magistrates of that city have passed a resolution urging greater activity in suppressing demonstrations partaking of the nature of bread riots, and asking for the appointment of additional police.

PRESENCE OF MIND.—Rare presence of mind saved the life of a brakeman in Melton, N. Y., the other day. He caught his foot in a guard rail as a train of freight cars was backing down upon him, and was unable to extricate himself. He thrown his body outward, as most persons in a similar case would have done, his head would undoubtedly have been severed near his body, and he therefore threw himself between the rails and upward, and as the cars came upon him seized a brake-rope and hung on with a death grip. The wheels crushed his foot, but he held on the rod drew the injured member from the boot, and escaped the partial loss of his foot he escaped unhurt.

The railroad people say that all the train hands were saved. All trains have been abandoned from New York.
