It is a well known fact that it takes a

little more work to keep down grass on strong land than on thin, but when the rapid growth of the crop and the increase of yield over the thin is taken into consideration, the cost is away down, comparatively less, the profits greater, and consequently,

life more enjoyable.

The land that is now of very little account for cultivation, if put into pastures, either for sheep or cattle, would be a source of profit. But here is the trouble: Most Farmers will say they are not able. But by working less land, say ten acres to the mule, and making that produce as much as twenty under the present system, with the money saved by raising our bacon, corn and sorghum, on the farm, one could buy wire, fence to realize at a time, and grow into grews to maturity. Then in my human opinion, independency would smile sweetly on the striving tiller.

3d. A more varied supply and better farm implements, better and larger work stock and a'so finer grades of all our stock. Large and able work stock can do more and better work and keep in better condition on less food, comparatively, than small and inferior ones. Then, in hogs there is the most difference imaginable. It is an old saying that "the corn crib makes the hog," but I say it takes almost twice as much corn to make a good hog out of a lard like, as it one of fine have tried it.

I hope to hear something better on this subject, from abler pens, and will try to profit thereby.


