The Cotton Tax. We make the following extract from the Columbia Phoenix: The Comptroller General of the State has instructed tax officers to include in their quarterly assessments all cotton purchased and sold by merchants, factors, brokers, bankers, or other persons buying or shipping on commission, or otherwise, which was grown this year, and now exempt from tax by the United States Government by Act of Congress and to collect twenty cents on every hundred dollars worth of it, the same as on other merchandize, considering cotton sold whenever it is shipped.
