How Shall We Hire?

Two years of free labor have brought terrible disasters to planters. After toils and trials, such as have rarely been endured by any class, we find ourselves without money, without credit, without provisions, the land impoverished, and agricultural capital depreciated nine-tenths its value. Debts and want haunt our sleep.

Well what shall be done? The answer is plain. Not engage in violence, not commit any offense against any government, real or pretended, not even do anything which Thad-Stevens may "reconstruct" of Gen. Canby try by "Edict," but simply pay no more for free labor than it is worth.

The State Convention. The Convention question is at last definitely and authoritatively settled. The negroes polled about 9000 votes above the required majority, and General Canby, in General Order No. 160, dated December 28th, notifies the delegates elected to assemble in convention in the City of Charleston, South Carolina, at noon, on Tuesday, the 14th day of January, 1868.

There were 124 delegates elected; of these 65 are whites and 69 are blacks. We will not trouble ourselves or our readers with their names. Though their acts, as legislators, may perhaps give them an ephemeral notoriety, yet none of them will be immortal.
