LOCAL ITEMS

Death of Rev. F. W. Pape.

We are grieved to record the death of one, so well known to a large number of our readers, and esteemed for such noble traits of character, and such usefulness of life. Rev. F. W. Pape died in Columbia on Friday of last week, of pneumonia. We know of few who have departed, leaving behind them a more satisfactory record of a well spent life, or who could bid adieu to earth with a more cheering hope of immortal happiness.

The funeral sermon of our departed friend was preached in Columbia on Saturday last; and on Sunday his body was brought to this place, and conveyed to its burial at Middlepen (which was the neighborhood of his most successful labors), and there interred with all the solemn rites of the Masonic Ritual for the departed, surrounded by friends and brothers of the mystic tie, among whom he had once been a prominent and efficient craftsman.

During Robberies.

There must be a regular gang of burglars in our town, from the number of robberies committed during the past week. The gun shop of Mr. Joseph Strauss was broken into and a large number of firearms were carried off; and Mr. Thomas Liver was the loser of a bale of cotton which was carried away piecemeal. At night or two after, thieves, five in number, were discovered in the act of carrying off various articles from the premises of Mrs. Marchant; and on the same night, the corn house of Mr. D. Louis was broken into, and the villainous desperadoes liberally husked and shelled as much corn as they desired, and carried it off; and the kitchen of Mr. W. B. Broadwell was robbed of some meat by an entry after midnight.

Measurably need some kind of a detective police system, or at least some night watchman to be on the alert during the hours of slumber, so that thieves may at least be prevented from going in such gangs, and committing such wholesale depredations.

On Friday the 18th inst., very little was done in our market, buyers wanting a concession that holders were unwilling to make. Prices therefore were very irregular and the market unsettled. On Saturday the market opened firm, with a good demand at better prices. The sales made were on a basis of 25c for middlings, which was our closing quotation for last week. The market on Monday was unsettled, and buyers unable to operate at the asking prices of holders. On Tuesday the market was depressed, and holders submitted to a decline of 1c. The market on Wednesday opened with a moderate demand, but became active during the day, at firm prices. On Thursday the market was dull, and only a small business was done at about 1/2c off. The sales for the week foot up some 2,400 bales. We quote: Low Middling, 24; Middling, 24; Strict Middling, 25.
