

Murder of B. F. Randolph, Negro Senator from Orangeburg.

B. F. Randolph, the negro Sentor from Orangeburg District, was murdered on Friday live and move and have their being. last at Cokesbury by three white men.

Randolph had been upon an electioneering At Newberry, an altercation occurred on trip through the upper part of the State, where to be affixed. he delivered incendiary and threatening peeches. On Wednesday he passed over the Preenville and South Carolina Railroad, and spoke and behaved in so violent a manner as to be a great annoyance to the passengers. On Thursday he delivered a flaming address at Abbeville C. H. On Friday he took the cars for Anderson, and on arriving at Cokesbury entered the up train, put his carpet bag and cane in the ladies' car, and returned to the platform. At this moment three white men rode up, dismounted and hitched ther horses about fifty yards from the train. They advanced rapidly towards Randolph and fired upon him simultaneously. They then jumped on their horses and made their escape.

Randolph fell as soon as the shots were fired, and upon examination was found to be mortally wounded in the head, chest and lower part of the body. The express messenger took the body in charge and took it to Columbis, whence it was expected to be sent to Orangeburg. The men who killed Randolph are not known, and could not be identified. although the murder took place in broad daylight .- Charteston Daily News.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.



EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, COLUMBIA, October 16, 1868.

N pursance of an Act of the General Assembly, passed September 25th, 1868, an Election will be held on the second TUESDAY of November, being the tenth day thereof, in all Incorporated Civics and Towns of this State, for the Election of all Officers provided for by the Charters of the said Cities and Towns.

The Managers of Elections, appointed in pur suance of an Act to provide for the next general election, are authorized and required to conduct the Municipal Elections aforesaid, until otherwise provided for by law.

The qualifications of an Elector shall be those re mired by the Constitution, together with a residence of sixty days, next preceeding the Election. within the corporate limits of the City or Town, and that he has been duly registered in the Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote.

The Managers of Elections shall open their re spective polling places for three days, next preceding the day of election, from 7 A. M. to 5 P. M. for the purpose of registering the names of the qualified electors and their places of residence.

All bar-rooms and drinking saloons in the Town or City where such Election is held, shall be closed on the day of Election; and any person who shall which prove only to be swindles.

The Managers of Elections as aforesaid, and each of them are hereby required, after due publication, and with strict regard to the provisions of the Constitution and of the laws of the State, touching their duty in such case, to cause such Elections to be held in their respective Cities and Towns, on the day aforesaid; and to take all the necessary steps for the holding of such Elections, and for the ascertaining and determining the persons who shall have been duly elected therest.



PROCLAMATION.

HEREAS, reports are being daily received at this Department, and particularly from the Counties of Abbeville, Anderson, Edgefield, Lexiston, Newberry, Chester, Laurens, Union, York and Darlington, that the laws are being violated, and the officers of the law set at defiance; that issues ful and unoffending citizens are murdered in old blood, and the murderers not only permitted but aided to escape from justice; that families have been forced to abandon their homes and property by fear of violence; that the authority of the fists Government is openly decided and denied; that threats of violence, and even of death, are uttered against prominent members of the Republican party, if they shall attempt to visit their Districts, for the purpose of discussing the political questions of the day; that declarations are apenly made by persons calling themselves I nocrats, of their determination not to permit it...r political opponents to vote at the ensuing election; and, to enable them to effect their purposes, and to everawe the people, large quantities of fire-arms, of the mest improved description, have been brought into the State and secretly distributed; that the public highways are picketed and patrolled by armed men, who stop and interrogate passengers, frequently abusing and assembly those who differ with them in political opinion; and especially is there apparent a systematic effort, by abuse and intimidation, to deter colored persons from the exercise of the elective franchise, and all this in transgression of law, in derogation of the peace and dignity of the Commonwealth, and in violation of the right of the citi-

The right of suffrage belongs equally to the white and colored race, and all must be protected in its free and peaceful exercise. Fraud or violence may vitiate the returns of any poll where they may be !! perpetrated, and I call upon all good citizens to aid the officers of the law in their efforts to maintain !! the peace and preserve the independence and puri-ty of the ballot-box.

The State Government, of which I am the Erecutive head, is not only de facto but de fure, and commands the allegiance of all within its territorial
limits. It is independent of Federal legislation
and of the Federal Judiciary, whose powers are defined by the Constitution, to be "judicial" and not

its own keeping; and the rights granted and conferred by it can only be affected or subverted by a

SCOTT, Governor of the State of South Carolina, do hereby issue this my proclamation, enjoining and commanding all magistrates, Sheriff, and other officers of the peace in their respective Counties, to be faithful, rigilant, and active in the discharge of their duties, and to report promptly to this Department every case where they are obstructed or resisted in doing so; and, in the event of resistance or assault, they are directed to apply to the nearest military por United States troops for aid and co-operation in en-forcing the laws and maintaining the public peace. In case of failure on the part of Magistrates, Sho-rifts and officers of the peace to perform these du-ties promptly and efficiently, either from neglect or 10. G. W. gations to the community,
And I do carnestly appeal to the law-abiding per-And I do carnesity appear to the law-norm, to pic or the Chate, to those who are identified and interested in her reputation and prosperity, te all who are opposed to violence and bloodshed, and to a condition of riot and anarchy, in which life and property are alike insecure, that they will aid more in my efforts to maintain the supremacy of the law and the rights of the people, by discountenancing and denouncing all violence and outrage, and by assisting the Magistrates and peace officers in arresting the perpetrators thereof, so that they may be

brought to condign punishment. In the eye of the law, the rights of every citizen, white and colored are equally sacred and equally entitled to protection and vindication; and it is my duty and determination to use all the powers at my disposal for that purpose. And if my efforts to accomplish this by peaceable means are frustrated, by turbulent and lawless men resisting the Fractu-tive authority, in the persons of its officers, I shall be compelled, however reluctantly, to arm and organize a sufficient force of loyal citizens to evercome that resistance; and the responsibility of the consequences, however disastrous and deplorable, must rest upon the heads of those who provoke
